Trophy Presented To A. A. U. of C. (Special to the Guardian)

MONTREAL, August 2.—Presentation of a bronze statuette of a runner by the Canadian National Recreation Club to the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada for its encouragement of middle distance running, was announced today by W. H. Kelly, General chairman of the Canadian National Recreation Club in Montreal. The offer of this trophy was made to the A. A. U. of C. at a meeting in Saint John in December last and an acceptance has been received.

The statuette which is being designed by Henry Birks and sons in about 18 inches in height and represents a runner. The base on which it will stand is to be of Canadian Birds Eye Maple and will be made in the Point St. Charles shops of the Company. Medals are to be awarded to the first three competitors. These are of 10 carat gold silver and bronze respectively.

On the fact of these medals a replica of the statuette will appear and the background will be something typifying the Canadian National activities in sports. On the reverse will appear the names of the winners, the distance and date of the competition.

Competitions for these trophies will be conducted by the A. A. U. of Canada and the finals will be run at the Dominion championship meet this year to be held at Toronto on August 20th. The statuette will be placed in the trusteeship of the Board of Governors of the A. A. U. of C., who will administer the rules and assume charge of the trophy and distribution of awards.

Tunney-Dempsey Fight to Be Staged in Chicago Sept. 15

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Tex Rickard will stage the Tunney-Dempsey fight at Philadelphia a year ago. Rickard consented to the demand of the board to limit the price of the championship in Soldiers Field, Chicago's lake-front, the night of September 15.

The New York promoter guaranteed the battle for Chicago today after the South Park board, controlling the stadium, voted four to one in favor of granting him use of the field. Rickard agreed to pay out the stadium for the use of \$100,000 for the use of absorb all expenses for converting the field into a fight arena.

Rickard expects the battle to draw a record breaking crowd of 150,000, with gate receipts around \$2,000,000, eclipsing the previous record gate of \$1,885,000 set when referee's decision. Tunney defeated Dempsey for the title in the Sesqui-Centennial Stadium at Philadelphia a year ago.

Rickard consented to the demand of the board to limit the price of the championship in Soldiers Field, Chicago's lake-front, the night of September 15.

To meet the requirements of the Illinois law, George F. Getz, a 61-year-old millionaire coal operator, will become associated with Rickard in the promotion. Getz will take care of the promoter's license, but as the board that he would not take any of the profits, and neither nor any other member of Mayor William Hale Thompson's civic affairs committee will even accept any complimentary tickets from Rickard.
