GRANITES LOOK LIKE WINNERS SAYS DUNBAR

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—There seems to be little doubt, writes Bob Dunbar, in the Boston Herald, but that the United States hockey team will meet the Granites of Canada in the finals of the Olympic hockey matches at Chamonix. The Granites are in the upper part of the draw and play England and then the winners of the match between France and Norway.

Rules For Hockey at Olympic Games

THREE TWENTY MINUTE PERIODS WILL BE PLAYED WITH TEN MINUTES BETWEEN PERIODS

TORONTO, Dec. 13.—The rules and regulations for the Olympic hockey games at Chamonix, France as officially set forth by the French Olympic committee, are:

There will be two hockey rinks. They will be 70 metres (230 feet) long by 30 metres (98 feet) wide, surrounded by a border 15 centimetres (six inches) high; the sides will be joined by a curve (rounded ends).

If there are more than eight entries, two groups will be formed, drawn by lot in December.

The two first of each group will play off for the group honors. In the group final there will be taken into consideration for classification the results from the preliminary games. There will not be re-played any matches already decided.

Each match will be of three periods of 20 minutes each, with a rest of 10 minutes between periods. There will be no overtime. The matches will be contested under the rules of the International Ice Hockey League.

Nfld. Runner Made New Indoor Record

O'TOOLE WHO RAN IN HALIFAX BEAT LAURIE JACKSON'S TIME FOR FIVE MILE RACE IN ST. JOHN'S

HALIFAX, Dec. 13.—R. O'Toole, of St. John's N. F., who started in the long distance events in the Canadian championships in Halifax in September, won the five mile race, the feature of the Newfoundland annual track and field events in the island capital on December 7th, and beat by one minute, fourteen and a quarter seconds the time made by Laurie Jackson, of Halifax, last year.

O'Toole's running was the feature of the meet, and he captured the feature events with lots to spare over his two rivals, T. Linegar and J. Bell. Jackson, who ran on the island last year, beat out O'Toole by about twenty yards and made a new record. Jackson covered the distance in fast time, and many expected the mark to last for a long time, but O'Toole was in great form and made a new record by covering the course in 27.23 1-5. Local fans will read this with interest and wish the youthful islander the best of luck for the future.
