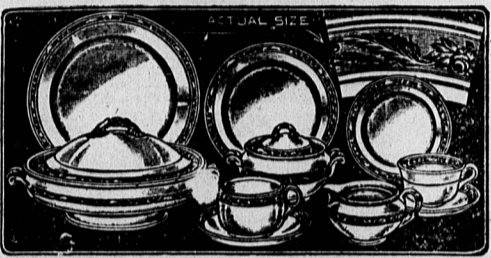

Despatches from Moscow indicate that affairs are not at all in smooth working order in Communist circles at the Kremlin. Estate of Dr. Norwood Probated at \$10,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—His entire estate, valued nominally in excess of \$10,000, is bequeathed to his widow and executrix, by Rev. Dr. Robert Norwood, Rector of St. Bartholomew's Church, it was disclosed today when his will was filed in Surrogate's Court.

The document was executed on January 7, 1930. Dr. Norwood died here on September 28 last at the age of 58. He had just returned from his birthplace near Halifax, where he had gone to recuperate from a previous illness, when he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage and died shortly afterwards.

Divining Rods To Locate Gold

BALD KNOB, Ark. Oct. 19.—They still hunt gold in the crypts of the Ozarks with divining rods, shovels and shotguns.

Tales handed down from father to son are responsible for the unconfirmed conviction of many mountaineers that fabulous wealth lies behind the bald shoulders of the Ozarks, believed buried there by Spaniards during the stark days when slave traders sailed the bloody middle passage.

The hill billies hunt the gold at night with divining rods—a homemade instrument supposed to do funny things when it passes over buried metal. Other equipment is a lantern, pickaxe, shovel and shotgun—the latter to keep away marauders like bad men, wolves and wild cats.

A large stone slab on which is carved "I S \$10000 Jan 1797" is the incentive for many hunts.

He added that he has had "very little trouble."

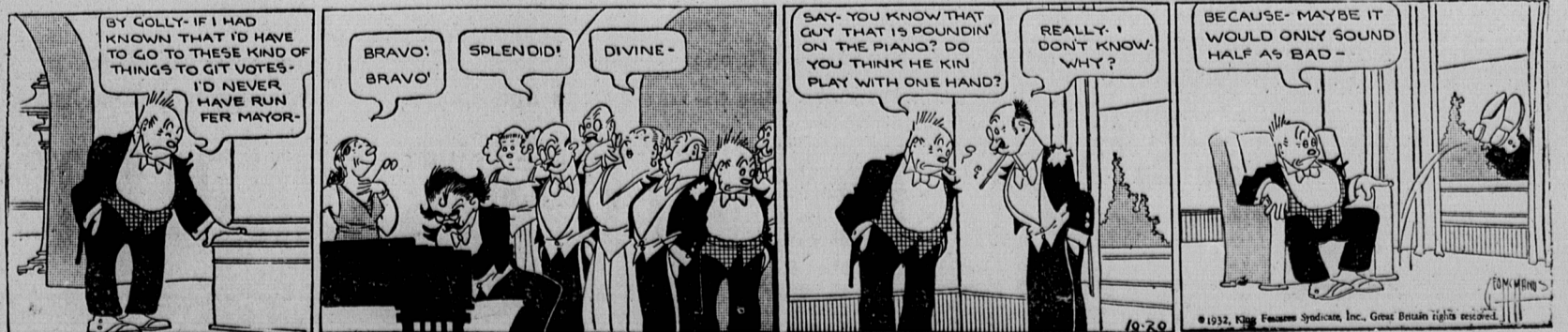
