proportion to their population as compared with Quebec. A redistribution would have reduced the membership in the House of Commons from the present 245 to 228 and therefore Quebec's proportion of the total house would have been increased.

Manitoba would have lost three members and Saskatchewan four. When the question of redistribution was before the House of Commons in 1942, members of Parliament for both Saskatchewan and Manitoba objected to the wartime census of 1941 being the basis of a redistribution which would reduce their representation.

Their objection was that many of their citizens were away in the armed forces or had moved temporarily out of their provinces to do war work but would return.

The new parliament will have to face that same situation but if the 1941 census is not used as a basis for a redistribution then the next general election, possibly in 1949 or 1951 and give the world a "clean slate" for future financing.

"We can't collect them anyhow," the Colorado Democrat asserted in a Senate Finance Committee hearing on a bill to repeal the 10 year old act which prohibits private loans to foreign countries in default of First Great War debts.

The assistant secretary of state, William L. Clayton, said the State Department has not discussed such a debt cancellation but he agreed that the defaulters "cannot and will not pay."

Mr. Clayton appeared in behalf of the repealer, declaring that the United States must help finance the war-ravaged European countries and a matter of good business policy.

Senator Hiram Johnson (Rep.-Calif.), author of the default law, said he will put up a stiff fight against repeal, and was given a week to prepare his case.

This young officer, it will be recalled, was one of the first to receive pilot's wings at No. 9 S.F.T.S. on May 10, 1941. The flight on which he lost his life was to have been his last flight of his second tour of operations and after that he would have been returning home.
