The two new engines of the P. E. Island railway will be brought from Picton today or tomorrow. It is probable that the Southport will be used to transfer the engines to the Railroad Wharf.

MONDAY'S GUARDIAN contains a clipping from the Moncton Transcript concerning M. S. Davison, which has caused quite a discussion among city sports, especially the paragraph referring to Davison's superiority over all Maritime bicycle riders. The facts in regard to Davison are as follows: During the last few years he has won quite a lot of prizes at the various race meets held in New Brunswick, where the class of bicycle riders is not up to the average. On several occasions he has visited the Island but without meeting any success worth speaking of. In fact to the best of our knowledge he has never won a first in this Province. Last year at Moncton where his home is, the Island bicyclists captured fourteen out of eighteen prizes in the six championships. Davison won one prize. Regarding the claim that he made the Maritime championship for 1/2 and 3 mile it is absolutely untrue. These championships were held in Halifax this year, the 1/2 was won by H. B. Anderson of Halifax and the 3 by Arthur Cameron of the A. C. A. C. Charlottetown. The records published are also fake. The 1/2 mile which he was said to hold is held by B. Brown of this city.

THE Star had a very pleasant and entertaining chat with Stanley Lawton, at the home of Samuel Girvan, Coburg Street, recently. Mr. Lawton is one of Sousa's foremost instrumentalists, the leading saxophone in that great American band's saxophone quintette. He is a brother-in-law of Mrs. Samuel Girvan, and has visited St. John several times during his connection with Sousa's organization. In a happy way Mr. Lawton told of Sousa's triumphs abroad during the last year. Of his seven week's engagement at the world's fair in Paris, where the people were delighted with his musical Americanism; of the six Belgian and eighteen German cities his band played in, also the tour made of Holland. After all engagements had been played, the band's arted for home, via England. Here Mr. Lawton left his fellow musicians to visit London and relatives in Yorkshire, arriving in St. John direct on Tuesday. Sousa and his band had been in America by the 24th of last month to play at the Pittsburg Exhibition, and to play at the opening of the Boston health and food fair next Monday, where Mr. Lawton rejoins them. On the 6th of January the band start on a western tour, opening in San Francisco and "playing" steadily through the western states and up from the south. By the time this tour is ended it will be Sousa's beach season at New York. By the programme, Mr. Lawton thinks St. John's chances of hearing the marching and his instrumentalists any ways soon are very slim. Sousa has been offered a big engagement for the great Glasgow fair to open next year, and also a three months run in Berlin, but he has not yet signed any contracts. In the way of composition Mr. Lawton says his bandmaster has written very little of late. A new march in commemoration of the unveiling of the Lafayette monument in Paris is his latest, and is about now off the press. It is very catchy. In operative work the "Bride Elect" was Sousa's last effort. It is thought however, the famous composer will write several new pieces during the lay-off season this winter. He is full of new ideas continually and never seems to lag mentally.—St. John Star.

Several bodies have been washed ashore but it is feared that the majority will never be recovered. The death roll now amounts to 46, of whom 27 belonged to Caraquet, 10 to Lameque and three to Shippegan, all in Gloucester county. It is the most terrible disaster of the kind on record in this province. The ill-fated men are all French.
