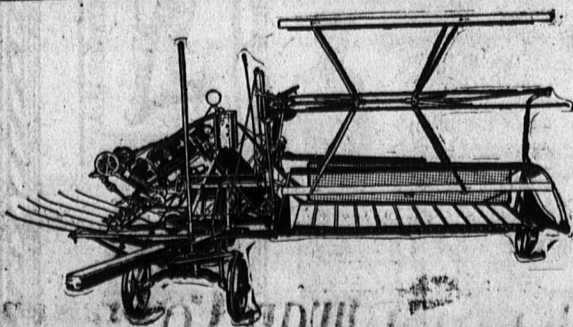

ENORMOUS INCREASE IN CANADIAN REVENUE

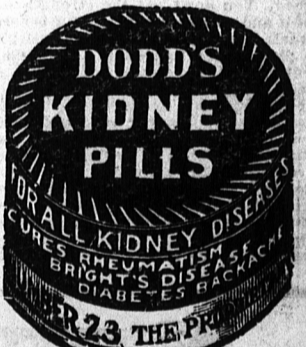

OTTAWA, July 31.—An increase in the customs revenue of Canada during the month of July of almost fifty per cent, is indicated by the figures issued today. The revenue during that month was \$11,081,894, an increase of \$2,589,273 over the corresponding month of 1915. For the four months ending July 31st the revenue was \$46,513,209 as compared with \$23,400,560 for the same period last year.

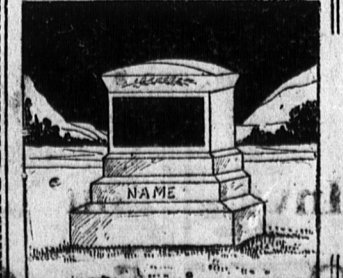
