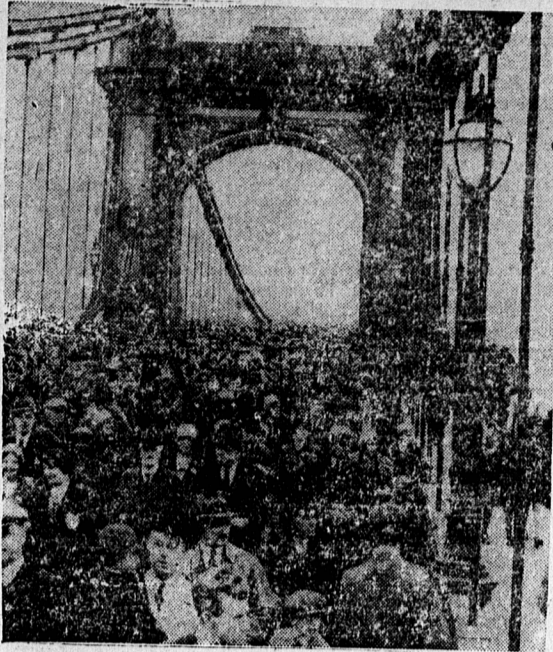

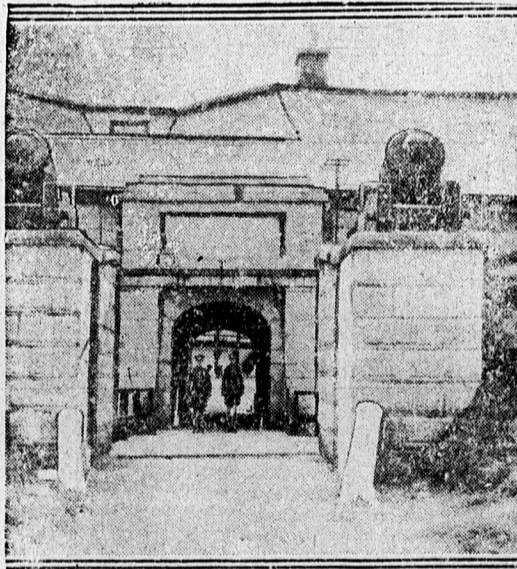


AWARDED TROPHY FOR AVIATION ACHIEVEMENT

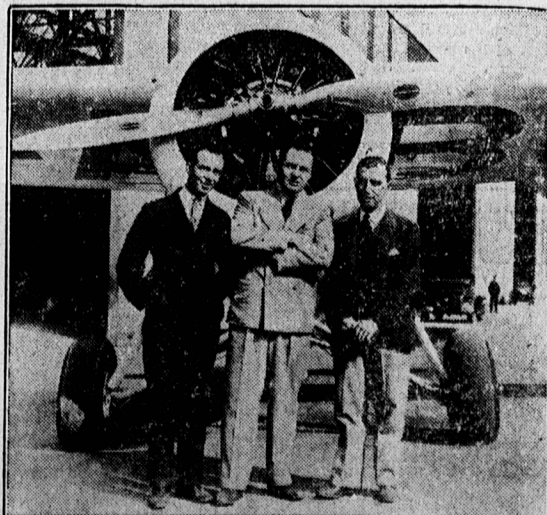
