**"Declared" Prices Keep Australia's Costs In Check**

SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 15—(CP)—Warlike profiteering as a whole has been successfully checked in Australia, although there are still certain abuses under consideration, the office of the Canadian Trade Commissioner has reported.

It said price increases have apparently been successfully restricted to those that were "unavoidable," and retail prices have increased by only approximately five per cent. Chief reason for these results, it said, has been "close and cordial co-operation between the Price Control Board and responsible commercial bodies."

"As compared with the limited sphere of price-fixing during the First World War, the establishment of price-fixing machinery in Australia in the present war has been extremely rapid," a report from the office said. "At the commencement of 1940 the Commonwealth Prices Commissioner had fully organized for this important phase of wartime control, with the result that price increases were checked throughout the Commonwealth before they had developed any momentum or become uncontrollable."

**Declaring Prices**

The Australian government did not try to impose a rigid control to the down prices to the levels prevailing before the war. However, increasing control, with the result that they were needed to meet higher production costs.

Several methods had been used by the commissioner to control retail prices, for example, an order of "declaring" prices of particular commodities. The prices fixed might be either maximum or minimum, but in practice the maximum price has been the rule.

Declared prices have been established for such commodities as bread, butter, coal, refrigerators, tea and other domestic requirements, building materials, tin and copper. The power to set prices also extends to all services; for example, an increase of 12 1/2 per cent has been permitted in shipping freights between Australia and its territories, the amount being designed to compensate for increased war-risk insurance, seamen's awards and maintenance costs.

**Co-operation**

The prices commission has full power to co-operate with established organizations controlling production and distribution of goods and public services. "Owing to the possession of these powers, it is believed that the commission has been able to conform to the principles of price control without the inconvenience and expense of direct government action, and in the opinion of responsible bodies price control in Australia was definitely successful during 1940," the trade commissioner's office said.

**Situation in Canada**

(Shortly after the outbreak of war, a Wartime Prices and Trade Control Act was established in Canada, with power to fix maximum prices, but the power has been seldom used. Rents have been fixed in a number of cities, but in general, and temporary maximum prices were established on bread, flour and butter, but now have been removed. Officials said the situation in Canada so far had been "most fortunate" with few shortages occurring which might cause a major price rise.)

**Fifty Flying Fortresses**

Six entirely new types of aircraft are now taking the air against the Nazis. In speed, offensive power and range they will supersede the Spitfires, Hurricanes, Mustangs, Wildcats and others which have become famous throughout the world for their exploits over Europe.

Outstanding among the new aircraft is the Hawker "Tornado", a single seater fighter with nearly double the engine power of the Spitfire. Designed by the builders of the Hurricane it is powered by a 2,000 h. p. Rolls-Royce Vulture engine, giving a speed of about 525 m. p. h. Its armament is heavy enough to shatter enemy planes in mid-air.

Also more powerful than the famous original is the Spitfire Mark 3, an aircraft re-powered with new Rolls-Royce Merlin engines. The design has clipped wings, and in some cases is re-armed with shell-firing cannon. Another new fighter, the Westland Whirlwind, is similarly powered.

Among the bombers the most sensational arrivals are fifty Flying Fortresses, the giant Boeing bombers from U.S.A., equipped with the famous Sperry bomb-sight of unerring accuracy. All Britain's new bombers are destined to meet the current need for very long-range actively combined with greater speed. One is called the Avro Manchester, another the Vulture engine. The other, the Short Stirling, with four engines, is both bigger and faster than the existing Flying Fortresses. For long-range work this bomber will be even more useful than the Wellington.

It is now disclosed that the fighters now being used against the raiders over Britain include Hawker Hurricanes, Bristol Blenheims and Defiants.

**Canned Salmon Held Beneficial**

The body requires a good supply of energy to keep its temperature at normal and to permit necessary activity and work. This energy is obtained from carbohydrates, fats and proteins. The essential of a well balanced diet.

Salmon is important because it is a good source of energy and at the same time furnishes a liberal supply of many other necessary factors to the diet. This good supply of energy comes from the fat (6 to 15 per cent) and the protein (18 to 20 per cent) content of canned salmon.

**PROTEIN SOURCE**

Canned salmon is one of the best sources of protein both in quantity and quality. Chemists have shown that it will supply all the body's need for protein.

Salmon is regarded as a source of minerals, essential to proper growth and well-being. These necessary minerals all occur in sea water. Salmon, in developing draw their mineral supply and fix them in forms suitable for human consumption. A can of salmon furnishes (1) a liberal supply of calcium and phosphorus, in the proportion necessary for building sound bones and good teeth, (2) more iodine than occurs in any food of land origin, and without an adequate supply of iodine we have thyroid troubles, including goitre, and (3) small yet very valuable amounts of iron, copper and manganese—elements that have been shown to play important parts in proper nutrition, also a great many other minerals unquestionably important but about which we know very little at present.

**Clean Barns**

Clean barns are good insurance against the spread of disease. Of course every dairy farmer should be directed to keeping all infections out of his herd for it is not possible with a diseased herd to get it on a profitable basis. Diseases are carried into the barn in so many ways that the use of disinfectants from time to time in the driveways, gutters, and even the feed managers is not out of place. It is the practice of many good dairy farmers to use lime—a mild disinfectant—in the driveways after the barn has been cleaned. We consider this an excellent practice and if it is mixed with a little ground limestone, it helps to prevent the cows from slipping when they come in from a muddy yard.

**Five Million Moles Help Britain's War**

Furs valued at £100,000 from many parts of the British Empire—including moleskins from England and Scotland—are on their way to Canada to help pay for the United Kingdom's war supplies.

All these beautiful models have been processed and made up in London, but the skins come from all over the world. There are Canadian sable, mink, ermine, beaver, squirrel and musquash, Persian lamb, Russian ermine, South American ocelot, neutrils, civit cat, and various skins from Newfoundland.

Britain's own contributions is moleskin, a fur which sold better than any other in a recent Canadian sales drive. It is also becoming very fashionable in the United States.

**Keep Eggs Cool**

Cooling eggs as soon as possible means more profit for the producer. Grade A eggs will drop to Grade C in six days at a temperature of 80 degrees. Grade A eggs held at 50 degrees for six days will retain the grade. Eggs held at 50 degrees have shown to be of better quality at the end of 10 days than those held at 70 degrees for 24 hours.

Precautions recommended to keep up the quality of eggs in summer are: 1. Gather eggs at least twice daily in a wire basket and let them stand in the basket in a cool well-ventilated place before packing. 2. Market eggs often, daily if possible. 3. In transporting eggs, protect them as much as possible from outside temperatures.
