SEVEN HUNDRED STRONG THE BRIGADE MARCHED TO SERVICE.

The Church Parade of yesterday was highly creditable numerically, in dress, and deportment and in soldier-like gait.

The kindness of Lt. Colonel Stewart and officers of the 82nd Regt. in placing their Band at the disposal of the officer in charge of the early morning parade was greatly appreciated.

The 10.30 parade formed up on the Brigade Parade Ground, moving off under the Brigade Band and led by the 82nd band.

The Brigadier, Lt. Col. F. S. Moore with 4 staff officers and 5 non commissioned officers.

P. E. I. Light Horse, Capt. MacDonald 8 officers and 64 men.

4th Regt. C. A. Lt. Col. Longworth, 24 officers, Band and 216 men.

82nd Regt. Lt. Col. D. Stewart, 31 officers, the Band and 313 men.

8th Field Hospital, Major McLaughlin, 2 officers and 39 men.

With the staff detail this aggregated a total of seven hundred and thirty four of all ranks.

On arrival at Pownall street the head of the brigade marked time until the 4th Regt. C. A. and the 8th Field Hospital marched off to St. James' Church.

At St. James, Chaplain T. F. Fullerton preached from Mark 8:25. His discourse was one of the ablest efforts ever given to the troops.

In St. Paul's Rev. Leo Williams, Chaplain of the 82nd Regt. preached an exceptionally able sermon.

REPORTS WHICH DO NOT AGREE

Japanese Say Russians are Retreating—Russians Say Japanese are Falling Back—No Fight with Vladivostock Squadron—Wide Extent of Japanese Outposts.

Russians Retreating, the Japs Say

London, July 2.—(Special)—Japanese reports say the Russian troops have retreated all along the line before the northern advance of the Japanese army and the country to the north west of the Japanese armistice is almost clear.

But still hold Dalin Pass. The Russians are holding Dalin Pass. [This is the pass near the left of the Japanese position through which they were moving toward the northwest and threatening Hal Cheng.]

Russians Tell Another Story. Russian advices tell a different story, Kuropatkin reporting that Kuropatkin's forward movement has been suspended and that the Japanese troops have begun to retire and the village of Medavize, has been occupied by Russian troops.

Extended Japanese Front. Southward of Kai Cheng the Japanese have 122 miles of outposts. It is also declared that the Japanese are being followed up by General Count Keller.

Untrue Report of Naval Fight. No credence is placed in the reports of a fight between the Japanese and the Russian Vladivostock squadron.

Agricultural Meetings. Duncan Anderson of Ottawa and J W Callbeck were in the city Saturday returning from the eastern part of the province where they have been addressing agricultural meetings during the past week.

The largest attended and best meetings were held at Bridgetown and Commercial Cross. At these centres live stock was exhibited and offered for sale as well as used for demonstrations by the speakers at the meetings.

At the afternoon meetings Mr. Callbeck spoke on The Type of Bacon Hog and the Feeding and Marketing of Hogs.

Mr. Anderson took for his subjects The Demonstration of the correct type of cattle for beef and dairying and the draft horse, also their feeding and breeding and in the evenings the cultivation of the soil with the care and appliance of manure.

Mr. Anderson was particularly impressed with this Province, especially with the neatly kept farm houses. The soil he says is fine and easy and very susceptible to cultivation.

The recommendation of the Committee appointed by the delegates at the meeting last winter was thoroughly discussed. With very few exceptions all were favorable to an inspector appointed by the farmers—subject to the company's approval but at Commercial Cross the desire was expressed that the Inspector, instead of visiting the different institutes twice a year as recommended by the committee, should, twice in the year, visit the different shipping stations and

[Down to one week ago the Russians held all the passes in the mountain chain which for 150 miles or more parallels the railway to the eastward at a distance of 30 to 50 miles. In four or five of these passes they held strongly fortified positions. By stiff fighting all these passes except the most southern, (the Dalin Pass) were captured by the Japanese forces. The Russian positions along the railway were thus menaced on their eastern side. Despite Russian denials we believe Kuropatkin is retreating to gain time and further reinforcements. The Japanese commanders would gladly give battle at Hal Cheng or Liao Yang, rather than further north. But if the Russians retreat, or have retreated, the great battle that was expected at once may not take place till after the rainy season. In such case it seems probable that the Japanese commanders will take possession of the railway northward as far as Liao Yang or Mukden, entrench themselves there, and establish a new military base at New Chwang which will greatly shorten their present long and difficult line of over-land communication.]

REV. G. M. YOUNG SAYS FAREWELL TO THE FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.

The reverend gentleman was at his best and his evening sermon will long be remembered by the congregation as the foremost of many able efforts, especially during the past year.

Rev. Mr. Young took for his text 2 Corinthians 13, 11—"Finally, brethren, farewell, be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you"—words of the deepest spiritual and practical meaning, expressing the highest aim of the Christian, his highest privilege, the unanimity of the church, and brotherhood which should prevail among all men

The retiring pastor in closing referred in feeling words to the many joys which he had shared with his congregation as well as the many homes of sorrow he had entered where loved ones had passed to the higher church above.

THE BODY IDENTIFIED

An inquest was held on the body of the man found at Augustine Cove on Thursday and a verdict of death from drowning brought in. The jury were Neil H. McPadyen (foreman), John Halliday, Hammond Carruthers, Jos. Wadman, Daniel McEachern, D. Ross. It is thought the body was that of Walter M. Brundage drowned while shooting some time ago at Bale Verte.

After the inquest the body was buried in a rudely constructed coffin near the place it had been found.

Saturday night an uncle of the deceased, who was 23 years of age, arrived and the body has been taken up, placed in a more suitable casket and will be taken to the home of Brundage in Tidnish, N. S. via the Northumberland today.
