A CHARLOTTETOWN gentleman who takes considerable interest in yacht racing hands THE GUARDIAN the following extract from a British journal:—Sir Thomas Lipton, in an interview says: "I had the assurance of Mr. Fife that the Shamrock was the best yacht he could possibly turn out. It seemed to me that we must be prepared to beat the Shamrock handsomely before we could have a chance of beating either the Columbia or a new Defender. In view of these facts, therefore, I decided to ask Mr. George L. Watson to accept a commission to design a challenger. Another matter which influenced me in this decision was that Mr. Fife has not yet lost confidence in the Shamrock. He shall have absolute carte blanche as to expense or anything else to enable him to improve the Shamrock as much as possible. With the Shamrock improved in every possible way—even to the extent of practically remodelling the hull, and the best boat that Watson can produce, I think I can count safely this time on being able to lay hands on the fastest boat that can be produced in Great Britain. The Shamrock and the new yacht will be raced in fair and square contest. Naturally, I shall have much more pleasure and more confidence if any newer boat can beat the Shamrock—even the improved Shamrock—as handsomely as she was beaten by the Columbia. In any case nothing will be done with the actual work until the challenge has been formally lodged and accepted and all the conditions settled. I hope to have this done in July or August of this year."

IN order to accommodate the large and increasing trade of the Revere Hotel, the proprietor, Mr. P. S. Brown, intends extending the hotel by the addition of number of rooms.

IN referring to P. E. Island produce the Maritime Merchant says:—Three or four vessels have opened up for spring business and are awaiting the pleasure of the people. Although the spring is opening early, it is perhaps a little too early for business which will not probably be brisk for another month yet. Some more vessels are ready to come forward and though they do not usually commence to do so until May opens, they may, this year, on account of the open navigation and the absence of ice along the coast, come earlier. We do not change the price this time. Oats are 37 to 38c. for large and 39 to 40c. for small quantities. Potatoes remain at 30c. and turnips at 39 to 35c. per bushel.
