The preliminary inquiry in the case of the King vs. Albert Arsenault of Summerside on a charge of perjury was opened before Ernest H. Strong, K.C., Sibiendary Magistrate in the Police Court, Summerside, on Wednesday morning and occupied the attention of the Court until 1:30 P. M. Four witnesses for the prosecution were heard. The charge arises out of a case tried before Judge Inman last November under the Children of Unmarried Parents Act. It appears that the accused gave evidence on behalf of the defendant at the said hearing under the Children of Unmarried Parents Act, which he alleged to have afterwards admitted to be untrue, and the charge of perjury was therefore laid against him. On evidence submitted before Judge Inman at the original hearing the claim of the applicant was dismissed and from this decision the claimant has appealed to the Supreme Court. The case was adjourned until Saturday at nine A.M. for further evidence on behalf of the prosecution. Mr. W. Henry Noonan appeared for the Crown and C. D. MacCallum for the accused.

The twentieth branch of the Carnegie Library in the province was opened at Borden yesterday afternoon at 2 P. M., in the fine new town hall, which has just been completed. The library rooms are situated at the east end of the new building and are probably the finest rooms of any of the branch libraries which have thus far been established in the province. The opening took place in the new hall to the west of the library which was filled to capacity. The Mayor of Borden, Mr. Willard Leard, presided. Miss Nora Bateson outlined the working of the library which at present consists of 80 volumes. Hon. Premier W. J. P. MacMillan complimented the town on the handsome new building and library rooms which they had erected and also paid a high tribute to the Women's Institute of Borden to whom the credit was due for having the branch established. He referred to his successful efforts in interesting the Carnegie authorities in the grant for the building of the library and sociology in Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University, the result of which was the raising of Prince of Wales College to the status of a junior college. He also spoke of the securing of the library grant which made possible the establishment of these 20 branch libraries we have in the province at this present time. Speeches followed by Messrs. MacLean, M.P., Hon. Heath Strong, M.P., Arthur Hugh Morrison and Rev. E. E. Monaghan, all of whom congratulated the town on their efforts in having a branch of the library in their midst and the benefit which would be derived from the books with which the new library was being stocked. Principal of Carleton School, and the President of the Women's Institute, tendered thanks to all those who in any way assisted in bringing this library to Borden. Mrs. James V. McDonald of Borden will be the librarian.

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"Why do I call it a reform measure? "We wish their cooperation. We want the cooperation of all. I think if they are sensible, they will agree that it is more in their interests than ours, that they should cooperate with us in our just purpose. Perhaps they will see the wisdom of that suggestion in the near future. We all have much to learn. And there is a type of financier and capitalist in every country—that includes Canada—who has fallen into a confusion of thought and has grown to believe that the people were put here for his advantage, rather than that he and the system he supports have no other excuse for existence than to effectively serve the interests of the people."

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"This I do not say by way of threat. I have told you that we hope for the unanimous support of all classes in this great and difficult task of reform. But I think it is only right to add that opposition from any class which imperils the future of this great undertaking, we will not tolerate. The lives of the hundreds and the welfare of too many people depend upon our success to allow the selfishness of a few individuals to endanger it."
