

Discusses Harvesting Handling & Storing P.E.I. Potato Crop

"Bruised tubers, late blight tuber rot in the field, and rots such as late blight and Fusarium in the cellars, warehouses, or other storage places, are responsible for heavy losses which are annually suffered by our growers, dealers, and export organizations," reports Mr. L. C. Calbeck, assistant plant pathologist, Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology at Charlottetown.

"Some years many over-sized and hence unmarketable seed potatoes further increase the losses in the late varieties. These losses, which often represent many thousands of dollars, may be reduced to insignificant proportions if the harvesting, handling, and storing of the crop is judiciously planned and executed.

The storage quarters should be prepared well in advance of the harvesting season and a thorough cleaning, ventilation, and fumigation, necessary sanitary measures against Fusarium rot and Ring Rot, should be carried out.

The storage quarters and furnishings such as bins, graders, etc., should be well sprayed with either (1) a solution containing 1 lb. of bluestone (copper sulphate) in 10 gal. of water, or (2) 1 pint of formalin (formaldehyde) in 30 gallons of water.

Believe Two Involved In Toronto Murder

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, Sept. 15—Belief that two persons were involved in the lovers' lane strangling of a Toronto couple was expressed by police today with the finding of a second piece of sash-cord in west-end High Park.

As police continued their methodical investigation into the auto-trunk slaying of George Vigus, 39, and his 21-year-old girl friend, Iris Scott, a free-all broke out during funeral service for the couple.

Cameras of five newspaper photographers were smashed when relatives and friends of the paper box company executive whose body was found last Friday in the luggage compartment of a parked car with that of Miss Scott, objected to pictures being taken. They threatened to throw one reporter in the grave—"a good place for rats," said one.

Police officers today said they held little hope for an early solution of the bizarre murder. Search for two watches, belonging to Vigus and Miss Scott, and Vigus' wallet was continued in the busy section of the park.

Although the pieces of sash-cord and the purse were found less than 250 yards from where the bodies were found, crammed in the luggage compartment of the car, police said they believe the murders were committed in another section of the city and the car driven to the park.

Police said the pieces of sash-cord, which were found in the trunk of the car, indicate that there were two killers and both were armed with cord. They said it was possible the killers intended to strangle their victims with the rope. An autopsy revealed, however, that Vigus was throttled with the rope and the girl choked by a man's hand.

Short Supply, Record Demand For Textbooks

The recent record demand for school books, coupled with the short supply, has been the cause of an endless "headache" to the clerks at the School Supply branch on Grafton Street, Mr. Allen Myers, manager of the branch, said yesterday.

The fact that a text book, such as Smith and Robertson's arithmetic, which is still a "must" for the students of Grades 7 and 8, was still from five to 10 cents a demand but sufficient quantities of both will shortly arrive, Mr. Myers said.

Nelson's school geography was another book which was out of supply for a few days but which has now arrived in sufficient quantities.

It is understood that while the supply of school books reaching the Province this year has been greater than in any previous year, several factors have resulted in the supply of certain books running out. One is the increased population between the ages of six and sixteen. A second is the family allowance monthly checks which make it possible for children to attend school who otherwise might not be able to do so.

A suggested solution for the Province's school-book problem and his attendant annoyance to parents of school-age children would be for the three Departments of Education in the Maritimes to get together and formulate a uniform school curriculum. Since the racial and historical background of the people of the Maritimes would permit such a uniform curriculum, it would be possible under an agreement by the Maritime Departments of Education, for a central organization to place such an order with a large Canadian book publisher as would make him very eager to fill it. It could even be possible for the Maritimes to set up their own school-book publishing house.

This appointment will create a new full-time Canadian diplomatic post in Oslo, with Mr. Garland succeeding Dr. Henry Laursen, who has been minister to both Norway and Denmark, living in Oslo. Dr. Laursen will go to Copenhagen as minister to Denmark solely.

Long-time member of parliament for Bow River constituency in Alberta from 1921 to 1935, Mr. Garland joined the external affairs department in 1940 and for nearly seven years has been secretary of the Canadian high commissioner's office in Dublin.
