## GRANVILLE WILL WAGER IN TIE FOR \$1,000 ON THE FIRST PLACE AUBREY HORSE

SIERRA BLANC, Texas, May 26—Phillip Granville of Hamilton, Ont., made his best showing yesterday in the 86th lap of C. C. Pyle's Bunton Derby, when he tied for first place with Glusto Umek, Italy, in the jump of 34.4 miles from Van Horn, Texas, to Sierra Blanc in 4:47.02. Granville, although severely handicapped by the injury to his leg and hip, paced the fleet-footed Italian over the entire lap, strengthening his hold on sixth place. His total elapsed time is 415.06.52.

GLACE BAY, May 27—So successful were the horse races at the Black Diamond park on May 24, that the management had decided on holding another monster racing meet on the afternoon of June 11. There will be a holiday at the mines that day and efforts will be made to bring in mainland horses to make the various cards more attractive. With warmer weather for racing by that time it is likely that the Aberdeen track record will be broken when the fast free-for-all horses hit their stride. It is understood that there will be a side bet of \$1,000 placed by a Dominion man that the Dominion entry, Major Aubrey, will win the race from Paleface, the Glace Bay community horse, winner of the May 24 race. The June 11 race will be over mile heats.

## His Bid For Fame

When Carl (Tex) Hubbell, portside flinger of the New York Giants, made his bid for fame a few weeks ago by pitching a no-hit game against the Pittsburgh Pirates at the Polo Grounds, the boys dug up the dusty statistics and found that Tex really had done something remarkable.  
The figures show that the quiet mound performer, who was discovered last year by Dick Kinsella playing with the Beaumont team in the Texas League, was the first left-hander to turn the trick in the majors since Hub Leonard did it with the Boston Red Sox in 1918.  
No-hit games are about as scarce as hen's teeth. In fact, up until the afternoon Hubbell toiled against the

Pirates no big league pitcher — either right or left handed — had succeeded in going the route without being nicked since 1926, when Ted Lyons turned in a perfect game for the Chicago White Sox. For some reason or other, the major league players won't let a ball tosser get through an afternoon with a perfect strike. There have been any number of near no-hit games, but somebody always has popped up to smear the program. Maybe it's the lively ball.  
Hubbell's performance was against a ball club that boasts of some good hitters. No club with such fellows as the Waner boys, Traynor and Grantham can be rated as a set-up when it comes to stick work. But Hubbell, figuratively speaking, stood them on their heads. Only four Pir-

ates reached the initial corner, three on errors, one on a walk. And no favors were shown the Texan in regard to the wobbles — they were full-fledged errors; two by Jackson, the shortstop, and one by Fullis, an outfielder. Two of these blunders came in the ninth when the Giants were straining to help Hubbell finish a grounder. Both of them should have been "outs."  
Hubbell set a great record for himself, but he can't be expected to repeat very soon — in view of the fact that it hadn't been done by a southpaw in over ten years until May 8 last.

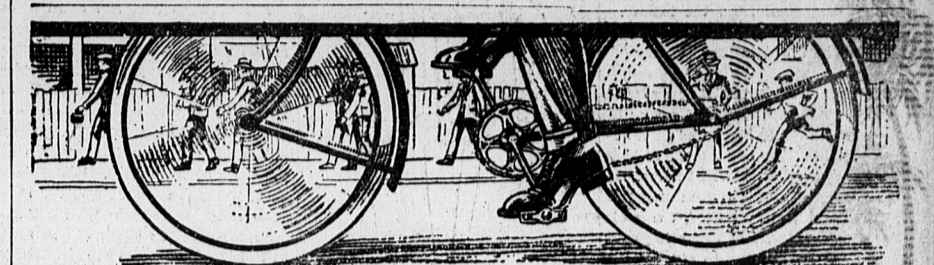
## BALL PRACTICE EDWARDS IN FOR THE STARS RECORD RUN
