of this Island's claims against Canada including amongst others the following—

1. The cost of the Prince Edward Island Railway, amounting to \$3,141,000 with interest since 1873.
2. Damages for non-fulfillment of the terms of union respecting continuous communication between this Island and the Mainland.
3. Fair transportation rates.
4. Our share of the fishery award. Thorough revision of laws relating to our fisheries and the protection of the rights of our fishermen.
5. Compensation in respect of the Public Lands of Ontario, which have been transferred to the larger Provinces without any consideration for the interest of this Province therein.
6. An equivalent for the increased subsidies granted the larger Provinces to meet the increased cost of Education, Public Works and Agriculture.
7. The payment of the subsidies upon an assumed population of at least 150,000 as was done in the case of British Columbia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta in as much as the failure of this Province to attain that population is owing to the default of the Dominion.
8. Restoration of original representation in the Federal Parliament.
9. The Tunnel.

AGRICULTURE.

1. Agriculture being the principal business of this Island should occupy a chief place on the course of studies in the Public Schools.
2. The establishment by the Government of Canada of an experimental farm system within this province should be urgently pressed to a successful issue.
3. This department should be charged with the duty of negotiating and arranging for better transportation facilities and fair freight rates for this Island's exports and imports and with the collection of its trade statistics.
4. A complete re-organization of this department under a practical head.

EDUCATION.

1. Remedy the existing grievance arising from the excessive prices and inferior quality of text books and school supplies. Let the Government purchase school books and supplies at wholesale prices and furnish the same to the schools at cost.
2. Provide adequate salaries for teachers and by a scale of increase based upon experience and competence give sufficient encouragement to them to remain in the profession.
3. Provide a thorough Normal School training for all candidates for teachers license.
4. Adapt the system generally to the special needs of this Province.

PUBLIC WORKS.

1. That the Province except the in-

corporated towns be divided into Road Districts and the road taxes collected within each district be expended therein under the supervision of the Road Officer of each District and that the deficiency if any be made up out of the general revenue.

2. That such expenditure be made by public competition so that all taxpayers may have an opportunity of performing work in lieu of taxes.
3. That all amounts in addition to such taxes required by the several districts for their public works be apportioned to the respective districts by resolution of the Legislature.
4. That proper provision be made for the locating, breaking, repairing and marking out the course of the winter roads.
5. That Road Officers receiving yearly salaries be not allowed any further sums for commission or wages in connection with public works.
6. A complete investigation of the Department, a re-organization and improvement of the whole system and capable administration of the same.

REFORM OF ELECTION LAWS.

1. Vote by ballot.
2. Repeal of all laws enacted by the present Government which favor persons guilty of corrupt practices.
3. Stringent laws to punish bribery and fraud at elections including attempts to commit corrupt practices.
4. Amendments to further secure the independence of members of the Legislature and the exclusion therefrom of persons in the employ of the Dominion Government whether paid by salary or by fees in lieu of salary. And generally thorough reform of the election laws with the simplest and most expeditious mode of enforcement of the same.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

1. The appointment of a Provincial Auditor who in Provincial affairs shall be given like powers possessed by the auditor general of Canada in his department.
2. A thorough investigation of the public accounts by competent independent accountants and the funding of the debt when ascertained so as to secure the lowest rate of interest.
3. The era of deficits shall be closed and upon a successful prosecution of our claims against Canada charged.

LORD MINTO MAY SOON RESIGN.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4—A despatch to the Tribune revises the rumor that Lord Minto, Viceroy of India, will soon resign. It says: Lord Minto, it is reported in official circles in London, has arranged to resign the viceroyalty of India early next spring, not on the ground of any disagreement with the home government, but owing to the condition of the health of his wife. India has never suited the constitution of Lady Minto, who found the sudden change from Canada extremely trying. Even the so-called cool season in India has affected her health injuriously, and her physicians have insisted in the most urgent manner that this shall be her last winter in India, and that when she comes home in the spring, when the hot weather sets in, it shall be for good and all.

ABDUL HAMID'S TROUBLES.

PARIS, Nov. 4—The Constantinople correspondent of the Temps says the reform party is continuing the removal of the old palace garrison to places at a distance from the capital and substituting reform troops in their places. A cruiser has been sent from the Golden Horn and has been moored in front of the Dolma Bagtch Palace, where its guns command the barracks of the Albanians and the Yildiz Souaves.

CAPTIVE FOUR LONG MONTHS

MANCHESTER, Nov. 4—Frances Seliger, a Nottingham schoolgirl, who, after a mysterious absence of four months returned to her home and parents on Thursday night, gave a strange account of her experiences. She is seven years of age and of engaging manners.

"As I was coming home from school," she said, "a man I did not know asked me to go on an errand. He took my hand and we walked to the station and got on a tramway car and rode a very long way. It was a long way to walk, too, when we got off the tramway car to the house where I have been, I don't know where it was, but there were two houses, a yard and a water tap in the middle. I cried and wanted to go home, but the man took me upstairs and put me in a room, where I have been ever since.

"He was kind to me and brought me sweets and a dolly, but he never let me go out or look out of the window. He used to lock me in the room when he went to work in the morning, and if anybody came to the door when I was in the kitchen he sent me upstairs.

Asked if other people lived in the house, the child said no. Her captor, she stated, had white hair and a long beard, but he was not old, for he could run very fast.

She said, "I knew he was not really an old man. When he brought me home he gave me pennies and a parcel and a letter, and then ran away very fast, and I ran home."

"The man, she said, used to wash her hands and face and comb her hair, and he kissed her every day. When she made a hole in her stocking he darned it.

THE ELECTIONS AT NEW ZEALAND

LONDON, Nov. 4—A cablegram from Wellington, N. Z., says the parliamentary elections will take place on the 17th, when the maintenance of liquor licenses will be decided. Upon being interviewed concerning the suggestion that arrangements be made for the Suez mail to be forwarded to Wellington immediately on its arrival at Sydney, Premier Ward stated that the arrangement would necessitate the employment of a special steamer, and the granting of a subsidy to provide a first class service. It would be incomparably better to spend the money on the Vancouver route, he said.

BELGRADE SURROUNDED BY 16,000 TROOPS.

LONDON, Nov. 4—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Belgrade reports that the heights around the town are occupied by 16,000 troops and that the Italian in the National Bank will be removed to Kragujevatz together with the general staff of the army and the bulk of the war material. Despite these military measures, says the Mail, all danger of immediate hostilities seems past. The national assembly sat for two days in secret session and as a result of its deliberations there was an immediate relaxation in the tension.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Nov. 4—Wm. Hatfield, suspected of being James C. Dunham, who murdered the entire McGilley family of six at Campbell, twelve years ago, will be formally charged with the crime. This information comes authoritatively from the offices of Arthur Free, district attorney, recently. The announcement is accompanied by the explanation that District Attorney Free entertains no opinion as to whether Hatfield is "Dunham," but wants to dispose of the case legally.

"There always will be some doubt in the minds of some people if Hatfield is allowed to go free," said a representative of the district attorney. If Hatfield is brought up legally and proves that he is not Dunham, the question will be settled for all time.

A score of persons visited the jail today and all but one declared Hatfield is not Dunham. This one is a woman, and declares that she has worked for her and that she is sure that Hatfield is the man. Her name is being guarded by the authorities.

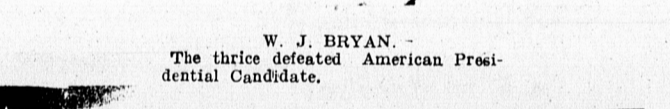
DISASTROUS FIRE PEMBROKE, ONT

PEMBROKE, Ont., Nov. 4—The most disastrous fire broke out here this morning about four o'clock and destroyed a large portion of the town, including some forty residences. The fire originated in the foundry of the National Mfg. Company, and spread with great rapidity. The fire brigade was next to useless as it could not start to fight the flames which spread so rapidly. Relief has been sent from Renfrew and Carleton Place, and the combined fire fighters are now fighting the flames.
