BOUQUETS PRESENTED—At the closing session of last week's Catholic Women's League convention it was decided to accept the invitation from Victoria, B. C., to hold the convention there next year. Mrs. W. J. McIntyre, the new National President, was presented with a bouquet. The retiring President, Mrs. M. J. Lyons, received an honorary life membership and also a bouquet and a hooked rug from the Charlottetown sub division. Mrs. Frank J. The magnificent cruising yacht of Dr. A. C. Muttart, of New York, which is at present at Railway wharf, Summerside is without doubt the finest equipped boat that ever came into the harbor.

Dr. Muttart is a native of Cape Breton and is the son of the late John L. and Isabel Muttart of that place. He was educated at Cape Breton and later on at Alberton. When about 17 years of age he went to New York University to study medicine and while doing so had also studied navigation, a boyhood ambition, born of the days when he sailed with his uncle, an old sea captain. Dr. Muttart has sailed around the world several times. He is his own Captain, engineer and crew. His yacht built by a famous New York firm is 70 feet long and 14 feet wide with a draft of 52 inches. It has a cruising capacity of 600 to 800 miles. It was built at a cost of \$80,000 and was made on Dr. Muttart's own design. It's interior and exterior, with the exception of the decks, which are built of teak, are of African and Mexican mahogany, even to the deck rails, not a nail is in the boat, as she is double planked with tobir bronze screws.
