DOMINION DAY.

When Dominion Day was first celebrated in 1867 Canada included but the four Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. There were no territories or other possessions. The entire area of the Dominion was 497,700 square miles and the population was little if any more than three million souls. We had 2,200 miles of railway. In the first year of the federal history the revenue was a little over 13 millions, our imports under 7 1/2 millions and our exports 5 1/2 millions. Our manufacturing industries were but in their infancy. Our 81 post office saving banks had but 2,102 depositors and the balances to their credit was \$204,588. Our chartered banks had a paid up capital of little over 30 millions. Our mails transmitted something over 18 million letters and something less than 19 million newspapers during the year.

Since the beginning of things in Canada as a Dominion our area has been our territorial area has been extended nearly eight fold, to 3,633,946 miles, and our population by about two millions and a half. We have now eight times the railway mileage we had at the beginning, four times the revenue and nearly three times the commerce. Our chartered banks have more than double the paid up capital they had in 1867. The number of post office saving banks has increased more than ten fold, the amount of their deposits nearly seventy fold and the amounts of their deposits 170 fold. At the same time the number of newspapers sent through the mails is eight times and the number of letters nearly ten times as great as it was on the first Dominion Day. It would be easy to show that like or even greater progress has been made in the production of our farms, our factories and our mines, and in the aggregate of the national wealth.

Within the third part of a century great progress has been made in really uniting the separated communities which before the federation were known collectively as British North America. The mainland Provinces have all been united by railways and telegraph systems, and inter-provincial trade has been enormously developed. One system of Government, a common Parliament, a system of general laws for the entire country, the centralised control of the customs, inland revenues, the tariff and of the postal system have hastened the assimilation of the former separated communities into one nation with common aims, hopes and aspirations. And withal the national spirit has grown until the people of the Dominion from east to west are everywhere proud of the title of Canadian and of their Canadian citizenship.

Whatever there may have been of desire for annexation to the United States fifty years ago, a feeling which lingered in some sections down to the date of our federal union, has since entirely died out. The desire for national independence which seemed a growing sentiment in the earlier years of the Dominion has also passed away. Especially have recent events, the war in South Africa and the part taken therein by Canadian soldiers,

given to our people an added interest in the affairs of the Great Empire of which we form a part, and a desire to see that great imperial fabric more closely united. Canada holds a vastly larger place in the appreciation of the British people and of the world than she held thirty-five years ago. And never before have the people of the Dominion prized so highly their citizenship in that world-wide Empire which holds within its control one fifth part of the land area of the globe, one fourth of the living human race and the indisputable mastery of the sea.

The anniversary finds the Dominion enjoying almost unexampled prosperity in production, manufacturing industry and commerce. Immigrants are thronging to our shores and across our borders in unusual numbers to people our unoccupied lands. Never was the national income so large, the national commerce so great, or the national credit so high. Our people are united and sympathetic with each other. Race and creed disputes have been relegated to the back-ground, and the Dominion presents today a peaceful, well-ordered and free community, full of heart and hope, facing the future with greater confidence than ever before. Truly the Canadian people, with so vast and goodly a heritage and so bright an outlook toward the future, have abundant reason to thank God and take courage.

A telegraph convention concluded a year ago between Germany and Holland has been recently ratified by the Dutch Parliament. It provides for a German Dutch cable system under the joint control of the two Governments which shall establish connection between those countries and their colonies abroad. One object it to get rid of the dependence upon British cable systems at present existing. It is intended to establish connection with Java, Borneo and China and by means of the American cable to the Philippines will have connection with San Francisco. When completed, Germany, Holland and the United States together will have a world-wide system of cables independent of those under British control. The agreement is the more noteworthy from the political suspicion which has long existed in Holland toward Germany, the latter power being almost universally credited with a desire to absorb Holland, on account of her valuable seaboard, her commerce and her colonies.
