On November 11th, a Remembrance Day ceremony took place at Montague. After forming ranks at the Legion Hall, the service was of two was marched in parade under the command of Douglas MacGowan to the strains of martial music on the bagpipes played by Donald MacLeod, Caledonia, and John J. MacPherson, Queen's Road, with drummer, Mr. David Hutchings. The parade moved slowly to the Montague Club where the memorial ceremony was held under the chairmanship of Capt. Hewson Kydd. After observing the two minutes silence, the members stood at attention as a mark of respect while the "Last Post" was played in honour of those who gave up their life so that peace might reign over the land. Following the "Last Post" the citizens were led in prayer by Rev. A. S. Adams.

During the ceremony, a mixed choir beautifully rendered two well selected hymns for the occasion, "O God our Help in ages past" and "Onward Christian Soldiers." A short address on "Remembrance Day" was delivered by Rev. Bryant who stressed the need of closely guarding the peace which had been bought so dearly by the very life blood of those in whose memory the service was being held. After the service was being wreaths, the benediction was led by Rev. Bryant. The ceremony closed with the singing of "God Save the King."

The following is the text of the address delivered by Rev. Bryant. "Not many years ago, an assembly of his size, would have contained many young men, who because of a loyalty to the land in which they were born, can no longer enjoy its benefits. We have come together in this place, at this hour of remembrance to show in some way our recognition for the fine service which they have rendered. One hundred and five thousand in two wars did not return. It is those men to whom we pay our respects. At a crucial time in the history of our Dominion, these young men deemed it wise to answer the call of service, and to join one of other of this country's armed forces. The high principles of our forefathers, the love of freedom, and the desire to defend the rights of the peoples of the world, compelled many of our countrymen to pour our lives in foreign

Would they not expect us to give a similar honour to, and respect for those who likewise answered the country's call, but returned alive? Their contribution is surely not lessened by having survived the conflict.

Our gathering today is especially in remembrance of the sons, brothers, and comrades fallen in the recent warfare. They shall never be forgotten. The sacrifice they made is incomparable. We, for whom they died, endeavour to show our appreciation for their efforts. The hearts of mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, and comrades are aching because of the loss of these young men. But there is reason to be happy too for the victory and freedom, which they died to obtain, has been won and shall be maintained. The Scriptures tell us that all things are recorded and remembered by our Heavenly Father. Among those things are the deeds of our fellow countrymen who died in battle. God shall not forget their deeds. We must call upon Him to show our dear His mercy and grace. Wherever the young man has fallen, God knows the spot, and God shall raise him up in that last day and according to his deeds. May it be the pleasure of our Father to grant them eternal rest. -Lou.

Cancer Foundation Reviews First Year. NEW YORK, Nov 12-(AP)-The National Cancer Foundation, organized here about two years ago, has finished its first year and a half of paying bills of people dying of cancer. About 300 patients have been cared for. From the records of these cases it appears that the cost of dying of cancer is too expensive for most persons of middle class income, and even sometimes for the \$10,000-a-year family. The Foundation was organized to help middle-class cancer victims in their dying days, a matter usually of months. It does not include the indigent because they are supposed to be reasonably well cared for by tax-supported institutions. The expenses are for hospital services, medical care, home nursing, drugs or operations, whatever physicians advise is needed. Much of the expense is due to the need for making the dying person reasonably comfortable and reasonably pain free. Some cancer deaths are very painful. Drugs and X-rays relieve much cancer pain. But they are expensive procedures that require nursing and 24-hour care. Hospitals already over-crowded are unable to make the room needed for all critical cancer patients. The foundation was started by Julius Jay Perlmutter of New York, whose mother had died of cancer. The foundation has no endowment. Funds are obtained by appealing to individuals for contributions of one dollar up. Individual contributions have run as high as \$5,000. The money contributed this year totals about \$200,000.
