DOCTOR'S WIFE ARRESTED ON MURDER CHARGE

(Canadian Press) FREEPORT, N. Y., July 9.—Mrs. Florence Conklin Carman, wife of Dr. Carman, was arrested today accused as the assassin who, a week ago, murdered Mrs. Louise Bates, wife of a Hempstead manufacturer by firing a bullet through her heart while she was standing in the physician's office.

MEETING OF ULSTER PROVISIONAL GOVT.

(Canadian Press.) BELFAST, July 9.—The first meeting since it was formed of the Ulster Provisional Government is called for tomorrow at the request of Sir Edward Carson, Ulster Unionist leader. According to Captain James Craig the result of the meeting will have a bearing on the Irish situation but there is no intention on the part of Ulsterites to set up a parliament for themselves. They claim the right to the constitution of the United Kingdom in order that Ulster should continue to be an integral portion of the Empire.

Clauses of the Constitutional Provisional Government which have not been exposed, expressly provide that upon the restoration of a direct Imperial Government, the Provisional Government shall cease to exist and it is in power, shall maintain and enforce all Statute Laws now in force in Ireland, other than the law establishing Home Rule Government. Arrangements have been made to receive Sir Edward Carson on arrival tomorrow. Four hundred Ulster volunteers with fixed bayonets will escort him to the place of meeting.

MILITIA FORCES IN SHAM BATTLE

Colonel Rutherford, commanding the Sixth Division, which includes the local forces, which arrived here on Wednesday evening, together with Major Hayter, of the General Staff, (also arrived on Wednesday night), yesterday morning inspected the militia camps. They just made the round of the different camps, desiring no formal inspection but rather to see the various units at their routine work. They first visited the camp of the Abegweit Light Infantry at Brighton where the regiment were engaged in company drill, and after watching the camp work, went through the camp examining tents and so forth. Afterwards they proceeded to the camp at Kensington where the Light Horse and the Ambulance corps are quartered. When they got there the Light Horse were found to have completed their marching drill, and the visiting officers accordingly only inspected the cavalry lines and the stables. This completed Colonel Rutherford and Major Hayter proceeded to inspect the Ninth Ambulance Corps, who were found engaged in their regular training work, and subsequently their lines were also inspected. From Camp Kensington the Colonel and his companion drove to the staff camp at Victoria Park, where they lunched with the staff.

REFORM OF THE HOUSE OF LORDS

LONDON, July 8.—During July Prime Minister Asquith will lay before the House of Commons of the government for a constitution of a new second chamber to take place of the House of Lords. It is not expected that any attempt will be made this year to translate these proposals into law, but they are being made in accordance with a promise in the King's speech at the opening of parliament that they would be submitted for consideration during the present session.

the afternoon the forces marched out of camp to the field manœuvres which are to take place today. Tonight they will bivouac near the scene of today's operations. As already stated the contending forces are designated "Blues" and "Reds" the former representing the attacking column and the latter the defensive force; "Blues" being under the command of Colonel Ings and "Reds" under Major Jones. The Abegweit Regimental Band accompanied each force up to Hillsborough bridge. There are about 400 men in each column, the "Blues" having a slight numerical superiority. In each force there are four companies of infantry and one squadron of cavalry, while with the "Blues" there are two-thirds of the Ambulance Corps and the other third is with the "Reds." The "Blues" will bivouac on the farm of Mr. William McDonald, Ryan. The bivouac of the "Reds" will be made at a point a little to the south-west of Hazelbrook station. At an early hour this morning the two forces will be in operation against each other in carrying out an interesting tactical scheme. The operations will be centred in the country along the Bunbury road, between Mount Herbert and Bunbury station and around the bridge at Fullerton's creek.

FIRE BUGS ARE ACTIVE IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, July 9.—The operations of fire bugs and false alarm fanatics have increased during the past six months with such rapidity that a special squad of detectives are at work in an effort to trace the offenders. Since the beginning of the year over three hundred false alarms have been rung in, and more than six hundred fires have been investigated by the fire commission and no cause found. During the month of June, eleven fires proven to be of an incendiary nature were discovered, while during May, two such blazes took place.

ROYAL BANK OF CANADA AT HAVANA LOST \$3,800

NEW YORK, July 8.—Jose Antonio Belano until recently assistant teller in the Havana, Cuba, branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, was arrested yesterday upon the arrival here of the steamship Saratoga from Havana. He was locked up in the Tombs on a charge of embezzling \$3,800 of the funds of the branch. Belano is 24 years old and lived formerly in Boston.

CONFEDERATION JUBILEE PROGRAMME

The arrangements for the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Confederation Conference which took place in Charlottetown fifty years ago are nearing completion. Various sub-committees have been appointed and have succeeded in drafting programmes which will fully occupy the time allotted, namely the three days in the third week of next month, August 18, 19, and 20. A considerable amount of work has been necessary in getting a programme outlined, one, that is, that would answer the purpose of so important a celebration; but the committee has been particularly fortunate in having some of the ablest executive men on the Island in its membership. The committee is especially indebted to Mr. Arthur Newbery, who has been indefatigable in his efforts to further the interests of the Island in making this celebration a red-letter event in its history. Mr. Newbery is always accessible and open to suggestion, with the result that his services have been invaluable, not only to the committee but to the press of the Island and Canada generally. Mr. Newbery has been appealed to for information regarding the history of the Island and the progress of the celebration arrangements, by different newspapers and magazines, notably the "Canadian Courier," which has already contained a lengthy article by Premier Matheson on the celebration and intends bringing out another one fully illustrated from information supplied by Mr. Newbery. This is the spirit in which to approach the carrying out of any celebration of this kind. The petit parochial spirit so often characteristic of the small man in such a position is entirely absent in the case of Mr. Newbery. As will be seen from the programme which is published below, the celebration is to be opened with divine

service in the various churches on Tuesday, August 18, to be followed by a public reception by the Premier on the Exhibition grounds, and in the afternoon with a review of troops at Victoria Park. On the evening of the 19th, the Hon. the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Rogers of Government House, while an aquatic parade will be held off the Park road-way. On Wednesday a commemorative tablet will be unveiled in the Provisional Building, to which there will be a procession of the various societies in the province. Speeches will be delivered by prominent men in Canadian public life. In the afternoon athletic sports of the Canadian A. A. will be held, and in the evening a banquet will be given in Prince of Wales College. On Thursday there will be a motor car trip to the Cliff Hotel, where luncheon will be served at one o'clock. In the afternoon His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Rogers will give a garden party at Government House, while the Golf Club, the Lawn Tennis Club and other out-of-door clubs will be at home to friends and visitors. In the evening there will be a grand ball in the Provisional Building. Each evening fire works will be displayed. Arrangements for the decoration and illumination of Charlottetown are in the hands of Mr. Frank Hertz and Mr. Newbery, and so far as arranged, these promises to be of a highly successful character. The Public Buildings will be illuminated by electric lamps and an electric arch will be erected at the entrance. The Post Office and other Federal Government buildings will be similarly illuminated. The City Hall, the market buildings and other municipal property will be illuminated also, while the banks and many prominent public citizens have agreed to carry

out similar illumination of their buildings. Arrangements are being made for the illumination also of Government House and the grounds of Government House, and altogether the city should present a magnificent appearance on the three evenings of the celebration. FRENCH LOAN IS OVER SUBSCRIBED

If this should prove true the applications have amounted to more than the entire national debt of France.
