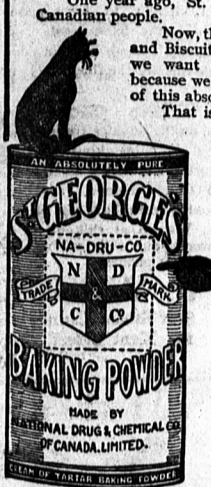

COUNTRY MERCHANTS SHOULD UNITE.

Sir:—Commenting on the article in your paper of the 3rd inst in regard to our people sending money abroad to mail order houses, would say we are in accord with what that gentleman has to say and to offer a suggestion in the line of bettering ourselves as probably a difficult question. However we think that first of all what we need most is more unity between our retail merchants, especially our country merchants. An illustration of this is as follows:—Take any ordinary country village and in it are two or three stores; those stores carry everything the people want and at a price even lower than mail order stores. The people from the surrounding country deal with one of those stores for one year, and at the end of each year there are ever some who do not meet their obligations and instead of giving the one merchant who supplied them the proceeds of his crop, etc. he sells the crop to No 2 and he supplies him during the following year. By this time No 1 is getting wrathful and looks for his money and he then pays No 1 and merchant No 2 has to wait for another year and so on. The surplus cash is sent abroad or goes to pay a note on a binder, buggy or something else and the merchant has to wait just because each man does not enforce payment as those people do for fear No 2 will get the trade.

Those things are going on from year to year and as a person who has the experience in the toils of it, I suggest a retail merchants' association, to regulate the charge prices on staple goods, the time for payment, etc. and to also see the payments enforced. The wholesale men have their association, so have the manufacturers and also the farmers and we say it is high time for us to move in the matter. We want more unity and less cut-throat business such as generally goes on amongst merchants and which a certain class of customers always takes advantage of. I would suggest that a meeting be called in some central place, of the country merchants, and discuss the situation which is at present a serious one for them, especially those who have limited capital.
