## Series Will Start In Nat. League City

CHICAGO, Aug. 26 (AP)—The 1946 World Series, whether Brooklyn or St. Louis wins the National League championship, will start with a two-game set in the National League City Oct. 2 and 3.

This is a departure from the wartime travel-conserving practice of holding three games in the opening city and the remaining four, if necessary, in the other city.

Plan for the series was arranged today by commissioner C. Chandler and representatives of five clubs still in the pennant running.

Brooklyn wins the National League flag, the series will open in New York Oct. 2 and 3, shifting to Boston, where the "Red Sox" have the pennant, if Cincinnati clinches for games Oct. 4, 5 and 6. If needed, the series will revert to Brooklyn on Oct. 7 and 8, with Oct. 8, an "if St. Louis wins in the National, the series will open in that city Oct. 2 and 3, with Oct. 4 open for travel. The first game will be played at Boston Oct. 5, 6 and 7.

If the series reverts back to St. Louis, the sixth game will be played Oct. 8, Oct. 10 will be open, and the seventh game will be played Oct. 11.

## Professional Cloud Hangs Over Olympics

(By Alan Harvey, Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (CP)—A centuries-old conflict between the early Greeks had a word for—cast uncertainty today over the projected 1948 renewal of the Olympic Games.

Current causes of discord on a topic that caused bitterness and even scandal among the Greeks and Romans in the early Olympiads came sharply into focus Wednesday when the Congress of the International Amateur Athletic Federation, meeting in Oslo, appointed a seven-man commission to tackle the problem of increased professionalism in sport.

Behind the appointment, it was reported, was the question of whether state-subsidized Russian athletes could be declared eligible to participate in the 1948 Olympic Games, scheduled for London.

In London, it was anticipated that Britain would break with the Federation if payments to athletes were authorized with the United States likely to follow suit. Withdrawal of Britain would shift the scene of the 48 Games from London to another city.

Similar action the commissions conceivably might not be held at all.

Other sources in London stressed another viewpoint—that a flat thumbs-down on Soviet participation might afford a political talking point for anti-British propagandists at a time of international tension.
