STEAMER LAUNCHED—The new steamer "Newport" which will run on the Cardigan river between Georgetown and Newport, was launched yesterday morning. A large number of people were present. Just before the steamer took the water it was christened by Miss Lucy Scully, daughter of Mr. P. A. Scully, M. P. and Mrs. Scully. The new boat is 77 feet over all, 25 feet beam and 8 feet depth of hold. She is built of southern hard pine, oak and native juniper. She is a double ender with two drive-shafts on either side. The engine room is amidship with passenger accommodation in each end of the hull. She will be driven by a hundred horse power Diesel engine, and should make about 9 1-2 knots. The engine was shipped from the Canadian Fairbank Morse Company and should arrive in about ten days. When it arrives the boat will likely be completed and ready for service about November 1st. Her builder was Captain Charles M. Fitzgerald who began work on July 1st. It is about fifteen years ago since her predecessor, now running on the route was launched at Georgetown. Prior to that the last vessel was the "Lady Napier" built by the late Hon. Daniel Gordon in 1902.

HOME RUN TWINS PLAY AT MONTREAL

Gehrig Breaks Up Game With Circuit Drive.

EDMONTON, Oct. 15.—According to an announcement made by Sergeant John Leslie, secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, the annual meeting of the Union will be held at Port Arthur on December 6th, 7th and 8th. The announcement was made following the taking of a vote by mail of the branch unions.

Although it is felt in some quarters that the meeting will be a stormy one, Secretary Leslie holds the opposite view, and states that in his opinion there will be nothing very contentious come before the delegates.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 15.—There was some inquiry from foreign buyers for grain here today and a moderate amount of business was done in wheat and a few odd loads of Canadian western number four barley were sold. The trade in cash grain in the local market was inactive but values were steady. Owing to the recent weakness in the cash oats situation at Winnipeg and the somewhat limited demand for standard grades of rolled oats a weaker feeling developed in the local market and prices were reduced fifteen cents per bag. The undertone to the market for all lines of mill-feed was firm under a good demand. The demand for grades of fresh and storage was good and values were firmly maintained. The receipts were 280 cases. Prices for imported beans were well maintained under a fair demand. Broken lots of choice white handpicked were quoted at \$4.40 to \$4.80 per bushel, ex-store. The trade in but-ter continued extremely dull but values were unchanged. The receipts were 499 packages. Owing to the higher prices paid for western cheese at the country boards last week a stronger feeling prevailed in the local market for these grades and prices were advanced 1-4 cent per pound. The receipts were 5,251 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 15.—The final report of storage holdings just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows on October 1st that there were 14,998,877 dozen eggs in cold storage in Canada as compared with 12,807,459 dozen on the same date last year. Storage holdings in the United States on October 1st were 8,541,000 cases compared to 7,953,000 cases on Oct. 1, 1927.

TORONTO—The local egg situation is steady. Brokers report sales of eggs at extras 47 cents; firsts 43 cents; seconds 35 cents; delivered, cases returned.

Montreal—With cooler weather the egg market is holding steady. Fresh eggs are jobbing on spot at extras 49 cents; firsts 42 cents; seconds 34 cents. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 48 to 49 cents; firsts 42 to 43 cents; seconds 33 to 35 cents; local receipts are much scarcer.

Edmonton—The local egg market is higher with dealers quoting country shippers extras 38 cents, firsts 34 cents to 35 cents, seconds 28 to 29 cents.

Vancouver—The local market is holding steady. There is very little interest being displayed from the east, but the good local demand and shipments of pullet eggs to the prairies are keeping the situation healthy.

St. John—The egg market here has advanced under light receipts and a heavy demand. Dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, delivered cases returned extras 45 to 47 cents; firsts 41 to 42 cents; seconds 30 to 31 cents.
