There is now no possible doubt as to the crowd of visitors at this time being enormous.

When such a widely circulated and influential paper as the above mentioned takes up the matter there is no doubting the lively interest manifested by the people at the "Hub". Our Tourist Association has done great work and practically without financial assistance from the public. Is it not time that our business men were "putting their shoulder to the wheel" to help along the good cause? Let us pass the hat for our country's sake. There never was a better chance to advertise this province with such little cost; and as the tourist trade means much to the Island, let everyone take hold of the matter and be a little more speculative, more enterprising and support the move which will mean thousands of dollars for the pockets of our people.

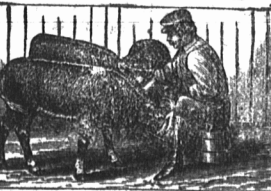

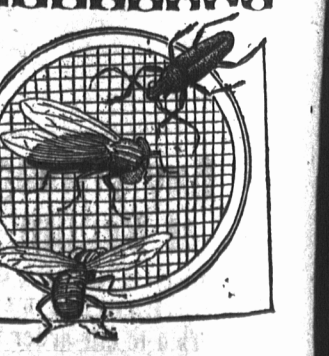
