**THE MARKETS**

MONTREAL, Mar. 18.—A feature of the export trade in Canada today was the improved demand from foreign buyers for coarse grains for deferred shipment and as the prices bid were in line with some exporters views a moderate amount of business was accomplished in barley and oats. Some ocean freight was engaged for 28 94 per quarter for May loading. The trade in wheat was dull owing to the fact that exporters cannot compete with the Pole at present. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market today was quiet and the tone was easier for oats prices being reduced 1-2c to 1c per bushel on all grades. No. 2 C.W. were quoted at 75 1-2c and No. 3 C.W. at 66c per bushel. The condition of the flour trade was unchanged, the demand for spring and winter wheat grades being still somewhat limited but the undertone was about steady. The market for mill feed continued firm owing to the good demand. Business in standard grades of rolled oats continued quiet and prices were unchanged. The demand for eggs continued good and an active trade was done at steady prices. A moderate amount of business was done in potatoes and prices ruled steady. Quebec varieties were quoted at \$1.10 per bag of ninety pounds in bulk extra. The market for butter was without any special feature to note, the demand being steady and prices were unchanged. The receipts were 164 packages. The trade in cheese was slow in all directions and the undertone was easy. Western grades were quoted at 16 3-4c to 17c per pound. The receipts were 60 boxes.

**Bad Fire Yesterday**

A fire caused by a leak in a gasoline tank and its subsequent explosion caused a bad fire in the clothes cleaning shop of A. F. Campbell at noon yesterday, which spreading rapidly, destroyed the contents of the store—light suits of clothes and part of the entire structure. Before the firemen arrived the gasoline tank exploded blowing out the plate glass windows and scattering blazing gasoline all over both front and back shops which were filled with clothing left in to be cleaned and pressed. On their arrival the store was a regular furnace, the flames creeping up along the front, and rear on the outside. Lines of hose were quickly laid and after considerable hard work the flames were extinguished. The building is considerably damaged. The upper store, being occupied by Mr. Jas. Farquharson and his mother, also suffered considerably, the rooms in the rear being badly burned and considerably damaged by water.

Mr. Farquharson, who is employed in the shop, stated that he was at work about one o'clock at the clothes pressing machine which is operated by gasoline under air pressure. He noticed one of the valves of the tank leaking, the thread being "stripped," and a fine spray of gasoline coming from the valve. Realizing the danger he started to close the valve but some of the gasoline struck the flame of the stove and was instantly ignited. Mr. Farquharson was wearing a sweater, and this became ignited but he kept on in an endeavour to close off the dangerous liquid his clothing being partially burned off and both his hands badly burned. Finally he ran to the street and gave the alarm. He was hardly out of the building when the gasoline tank exploded.

Mr. Farquharson at once received medical assistance, both hands being now bandaged.

Mr. A. F. Campbell the proprietor of the store is at present in Montague and it could not be learned if there was any insurance.

The building is owned by the Faughy Estate.

A glass partition separating the front and back shops was shattered and atoms while the plate glass windows in front were smashed in small pieces.

MISS IDA WEBSTER

**Dr. Cook Is Granted Parole**

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 18.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, explorer and oil stock promoter, was granted a parole today from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth by Judge James Wilson of the United States district court. Cook was sentenced in 1923 for misuse of the mails in promoting oil companies. Dr. Cook has been in poor health and this was one of the reasons why he applied for a parole.

**Plan of Action Calls For Expenditure of Half Million**

OTTAWA, Ont., Mar. 18.—Endorsation of the principles of health and life conservation by a representative group of outstanding Canadians, was the net result of the meeting of the honorary advisory board of the Canadian social hygiene council, held in the house of Commons here yesterday.

The board laid down a suggested plan of action for future work, calling for the raising and expenditure of \$543,000 in the next three years to advance in Canada the cause of disease prevention.
