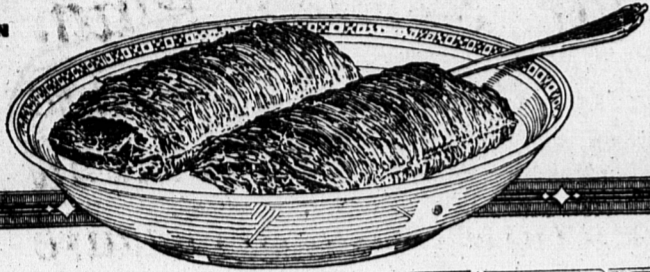

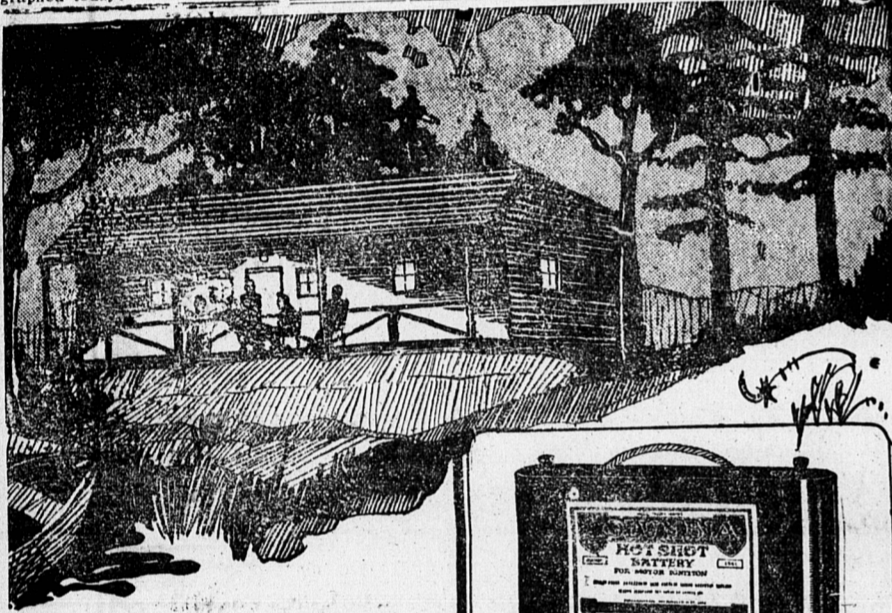
DOUBT ITALY WILL OBTAIN DEMANDS

ROME, July 4.—There is little hope of Italy obtaining her demand for 20 per cent of the German indemnity, the Paris correspondent of the Idea Nazionale telegraphed today.

"Considerable pessimism prevails in Paris regarding possibility of Italy obtaining her indemnity demands," the correspondent said. "While Millerand and other French officials are willing to renounce five per cent of the French portion of the indemnity in favor of Italy, the majority of allied dele-

gates strongly oppose such action, England will not renounce one cent of her share. Preliminary conversations between Italian and French representatives failed to any definite results as regards the indemnity question."

THE LOBSTER SEASON.—The lobster season just closed, taken on the whole was a very successful one. The lobsters held out well all round, particularly in the Tignish section. The late season operative from Victoria to West Point, opens on August 16th and closes on October 15th. Mackerel and cod continue to be very scarce the rough weather of late interfering to a great extent with fishing operations.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court was occupied yesterday with the case of Henry Murray vs. Kentford L. Waite, action of money received by plaintiff for use of plaintiff and trover, tried before a judge and jury. The case for the plaintiff was finished and case for defendant is now in progress. "FIXING" THE ROADS.—The York Road, Pleasant Grove, and other roads in that section are reported in very bad condition. These are roads which the Government have been undertaking to "fix" and they have "fixed" them so well that they now are about as bad as they can possibly be. These roads were in very good condition before the present muddling with them began. All that was required was to have the ruts filled in. Instead of filling in these ruts the sods are dumped along the middle of the road to a height of three feet in places and the consequence is all sorts of trouble and complaining as the result of this method of "fixing" the roads. One woman driving a team on Saturday had a good set of traces and harness broken. And a motor truck sustained a broken main spring and other damage. Union road is reported in good shape, all but about a quarter the next Whistley's farm and at this section the travelling tourist will meet bumps, sufficient almost to jolt one out of a car. The great trouble is that after piling up the centre of the road with the thick sods they are left there, whereas they should be well harrowed and then given a thorough going over with the roller. But there is neither harrow nor roller. One man declared that if they would leave these roads alone and fill in the ruts some good would be done but the present work is far worse than doing nothing.
