The interior of S. A. McDonald's store in this city has been suitably decorated with emblematic colors and flags for the coming coronation celebration.

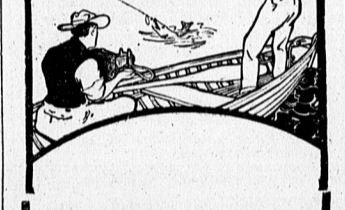
