Latest News of the City
and Province.

DAIRYMEN have been taking advantage of the fine weather of the last week to get in their supply of ice for next summer.

STANLEY Bridge Dairying Company have ceased operating their separator since Feb 8th. A large amount of butter has been made at Kensington from the cream separated at this station.

A VALUED correspondent in Cavendish writes: As a result of the visit and addresses of Prof. Gilbert, reports from the country are to the effect that there will be much greater interest taken in the poultry business next summer. Farmers are enquiring where they can get pure bred Barred Plymouth Rocks, which were so highly recommended by the Prof. Parties having such should advertise them in the Island papers.

CAVENDISH Literary Society has lately added to their Library quite a number of new volumes among which are, David Harum, Richard Carvel, Emerson's Representative Men; The story of an African Farm; The Deemster, (Hall Caine); A Little Journey In The World; (Warner); Treasure Island (Stevenson); A Single Life; (E. S. Phillips); There are now over 400 volumes in this library.

Centr 1 Division S. of T. held its regular meeting on Friday evening 9th inst. Three candidates were initiated into the Order for that evening. This Division has now a membership of fifty four active temperance workers. The program for next meeting is a Temperance Journal with Henry S. McClure as editor and a large staff of contributors. We expect some sledge-hammer blows to be dealt at the strong hold of the traffic.

At a meeting of the Trustees of the Black River Methodist Church held last month it was decided to build a new porch to the church, and to give two coats of paint on the outside, including the roof. The cost of porch and painting will be taken out of a legacy of \$100.00 left to the church by the late Mrs. Jane Court. The same lady put a new organ in the church a few years ago. All the above work is to be done, on or before the first of July next.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS, Little York. At a meeting of the Little York Congregation held recently, it has decided to make the following changes and improvements on the Little York Church, viz: Inside, to remove the pulpit sufficiently far from the west wall to give space for the choir at the rear of the pulpit; to fill the space now used by the choir with pews; to ceil the ceiling in wood; paper the walls; paint the woodwork, and put in new window blinds. Outside, to put on a new roof, (part of which was put on two years ago) oil and stain the roof, and paint the walls.
