NEW REGIME IN CUBA BEGINS RULE

Opposition of Several Hundred Army Officers Is Disregarded.

HAVANA, Sept. 12. — (A.P.) — A Cuban Government made up exclusively of men who fought to oust Gerardo Machado tonight took this island's destinies into its hands as several hundred army officers outspoken in their opposition remained barricaded in their hotel.

One month to the day after Machado was ousted, the tall new President, Dr. Ramon Grau San Martin, wore in his Cabinet of eight men who battled with him against the former Premier.

Disregard Opposition

Apparently paying little attention to the storm clouds of opposition, the regime set to work on the Republic's manifold problems. As a guide mark they had the declaration of Gran San Martin that "Cuba at last is free."

"I feel happy to say that Cuba at last is free among the civilized nations of the world," the President told a loudly-cheering crowd which assembled in the Palace to witness the formal swearing of the Cabinet.

"At last Cuba has a stable government," he added. "All that is needed is to assure prosperity, and we hope that prosperity will come quickly."

Toronto Likely Starting Point For Atlantic Hop

Flying Mollisons Make Plans To Better World's Long Distance Flight Record.

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—(C.P.)—Toronto and not Montreal is now likely to be the scene of the start of James and Amy Mollison, world famed British flyers on their next trans-Atlantic flight. F.D. Brimblecombe, Secretary of the Montreal Light Aeroplane tonight stated he had received a letter from Mrs. Mollison indicating the change in plans.

While in Montreal some time ago Mrs. Mollison looked about for suitable spots from which to start a heavy fuel laden plane on an attempt to better the world's long distance flight record and said she was favorably impressed with a wide concrete highway in Ville St.

Immediate Agreement On Coal Code Sought By NRA.

Johnson Begins Drive to Force Industry to Observe "Blue Eagle."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—A renewed effort to crush the long-standing deadlock over a bituminous coal code was begun today by Hugh S. Johnson, the N.R.A. director, simultaneously with an announcement that "compliance boards" would be set up in every community to compel observance of blue eagle agreements.

With the reports reaching Washington of plans by impatient coal miners in Pennsylvania to strike as a means of hurrying along an agreement among soft coal operators, the recovery administration moved for quick arbitration of disputed points.

At a brief public hearing, the various groups of mine owners were directed to name representatives to begin immediate conferences designed to reach a general agreement upon a code.

U. S. Weather Bureau Issues Storm Warning

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(A.P.)—The United States Weather Bureau tonight issued the following storm warning:

"Advisory nine p. m. tropical disturbance centered about midway between San Juan and Bermuda, moving northwestward or west northward about 11 miles per hour attended by gales and possibly by winds hurricane force over small area. Caution advised vessels in path. Tropical disturbance in western Caribbean Sea central about 100 miles northeast of Belize, Honduras, moving slightly east of north with increasing intensity now attended by gales over considerable area. Centre will pass near Cozumel Island Wednesday and through western Yucatan Channel Wednesday afternoon or night. This disturbance will increase further in intensity. Caution advised vessels in path."

Car Sales Up At Toronto Show

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—Automobile sales, greater than any during the past four years were reported by exhibitors at the close of the Canadian National Exhibition Saturday. One firm reported sales of "at least 75 per cent better than last year" while another company declared the sales of cars and trucks "exceed anything experienced over a period of years."

Revolt By Communists Was Feared

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—(A.P.)—A brochure purporting to substantiate the oft-repeated charges that Communists planned an armed revolution prior to the accession to power of Chancellor Adolf Hitler was issued today by the anti-Communist organization of Germany.

Supported by Catholic and Protestant organizations who opposed Communism, the book purports to reveal "official documents" said to have been seized by police in Communist raids.

In some circles the work was regarded as preparing the German mind for the opening of the trial at Leipzig September 21 of those charged with responsibility for the Reichstag fire.

DICTATORIAL TRIUMVIRATE FOR AUSTRIA

VIENNA, Sept. 12.—A report that an Austrian Cabinet shakeup was impending which will result in the establishment of a dictatorial triumvirate appeared in a Vienna newspaper today at the close of ceremonies during which the leader of the Austrian Fascists demanded Socialists be thrown out of the City Government.

The Socialists have been predominant since the Republic was founded, the city voting 60 percent for that party in the last municipal election.

The exhibition was opened by W. G. Ernst, Lunenburg's representative in Parliament, who expressed hope in his opening speech that the Federal Government would soon name a Commission of practical fishermen to investigate the possibility of wider markets for the sea products of this Province.

10,000 MINERS ON STRIKE IN PENNSYLVANIA

Southwestern Pennsylvania Coal Fields Seethe With Unrest.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., Sept. 12.—(A.P.)—The vast soft coal fields of southwestern Pennsylvania seethed with unrest tonight as plans went forward for a general mine "holiday."

Already, 10,000 miners in five counties have laid down their tools and Martin Ryan, leader of a group sponsoring the walkout, said the entire district would be idle tomorrow.

Leader of Strike

Ryan is President of the United Mine Workers Local at the Frick Colonial No. 4 mine. He was one of the leaders in last month's strike at Frick Operations, which resulted in violence and bloodshed and the calling of National guardsmen to preserve order.

Leaders in the new strike movement object to delay in signing of a coal code at Washington. They point out that Edward F. McGrady, Deputy Secretary of Labor, promised them a month ago that the Government would give the miners relief and say that continued delay at Washington is making the men "very restless."

Firemen Called To Cope With Midnight Blaze

A midnight fire alarm summoned the firemen to fight a blaze in the Connolly Estate Building on Queen Street last night. The fire was confined to a toilet room and stairway on the second floor. Although there was little actual damage to the building itself, smoke and water were responsible for some loss of merchandise stored on the ground floor and owned by Mr. P. W. Turner and by Mr. H. M. Simpson. The store of Mr. Alex MacPherson which is also on the ground floor was undamaged.

Due to the large quantity of smoke in the building the firemen experienced great difficulty in locating the fire, and in coping with it. The two upper stories consist chiefly of unoccupied office rooms, and these quickly filled with smoke. The firemen were out almost an hour, before the blaze was finally extinguished.

The goods damaged were covered by insurance.

Hon. F.L. Beique Dies In Montreal

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—Hon. Frederic Ligori Beique, one of the oldest members of the Senate and a celebrated lawyer and financier, died here today. Senator Beique was 88 years old and in recent months had been in failing health.

After a long career as an eminent appeal counsel, Frederic Ligori Beique was appointed to the Senate in 1902 by Lord Minto. In the 30 years he was in the Upper Chamber he was regarded as one of its ablest members. His death creates the 11th vacancy in the Senate, three of them from Quebec.

Rutherford Discredits Theory

LEICESTER, England, Sept. 12.—Lord Rutherford today discredited the theory that immense power could be derived from the breakdown of the atom.

"Energy produced by the breaking down of the atom is a very poor kind of thing," he said before the British Association for the Advancement of Science. "Anyone who expects a source of power from the transformation of these atoms is talking moonshine."

Lord Rutherford is director of the Cavendish Laboratory, University of Cambridge.

Sought In Connection With Slaying

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 12.—(A.P.)—Police investigating the slaying by strangulation of Margaret McCarthy, 10 year old Sonerville girl, tonight sought Harry P. Cahill, 42, of Lawrence and Somerville, who vanished Sunday night.

Cahill knew the McCarthy girl and members of her family intimately. He abandoned automobile and some of his clothing, torn as though in a struggle, was found yesterday on the shores of Silver Lake, Wilmington. The child's body was found Saturday in a clump of bushes.

Urges Inflation To Help United States Farmers

Indications Point To Inflation In Near Future If Prices Do Not Pick Up.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—An immediate "rational" inflation to bring higher prices to cotton and other United States farmers, either through issuance of new money or lowering the gold content of the dollar, was urged upon President Roosevelt today by Senator Harrison, Mississippi Democrat, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Although Harrison refrained from disclosing the President's reaction to his proposal, there were indications in other quarters that some action might be taken soon in the direction of regulated inflation if prices, particularly those received by the farmers, did not pick up.

Harrison would not say specifically what he told the President, but referred newspapermen to a speech and a statement he made a few days ago in Mississippi.

In this, Harrison said inflation through open market operations of the federal reserve banks was proving a slow process and that he favored immediate application of either one of the other two plans authorized by Congress—issuance of up to \$3,000,000 in treasury notes or reducing the gold content of the dollar.

Dollfuss Is Subject Of Labor Newspaper Attack

LONDON, Sept. 12.—"Dollfuss unveiled" is the subject of a leading editorial in the Daily Herald, Labor newspaper, in which it is stated Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss of Austria is "out to crush democracy, trades unionism and Socialism at the behest of Premier Mussolini of Italy."

"It is now clear that the 'Austrian question' is a conflict between continental great powers for control of the Danubian states," the newspaper says. "It is the pre-war Balkan conflict over again. Austrian Socialism and Austrian democracy are the victims of the rival imperialisms of Germany and Italy. The attitude of Great Britain should be plain beyond doubt. In a question of preserving the peace of Europe and the world and in bringing, through the League of Nations, the full force of civilization into action against any breaker of the peace, this country must play its full part and can do so with the knowledge she will have the full support of the Commonwealth."

In conclusion the Herald emphasizes it is not Britain's duty or interest to participate in European intrigues which would entail the risk of straining the imperial connection to the breaking.

Hotel Keeper Pleads Guilty To Killing

VALLEYFIELD, Que., Sept. 12.—Henri Simard, hotel keeper of St. Stanislaus, Que., was arrested today on a charge of murder arising out of the death of William Garrow of Newman, N. Y., who died in hospital at Malone, N. Y., from bullet wounds allegedly inflicted by Simard.

The charge was laid following an inquest into Garrow's death held at Malone today. H. Simard attended the inquest in custody and when the coroner ruled the shooting had taken place on the Canadian side of the border was returned to Canada where he was formally arrested on a charge of murder. He appeared in court here today and pleaded not guilty.

The hotel keeper gave his age as 64 years and was placed in the Valleyfield jail to await further court proceedings.

Earl Of Kerry Is Killed

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The Earl of Kerry, 19-year-old grandson of Canada's Governor-General from 1883 to 1888, was killed tonight when he fell under a train at the Regents Park underground station.

He was heir to the sixth Marquess of Lansdowne, son of Canada's fifth Governor-General.

HIGHWAY ACCIDENT AT IONA

Painful Injuries Sustained In Motor Car Collision.

A collision of two cars at a blind corner in Iona yesterday resulted in painful injury to several people and damage of the cars involved. One car, driven by Mr. James McIsaac, Iona, had been proceeding south, and the other driven by Rev. C. J. McCarthy, Charlottetown, had been travelling east. Neither of the drivers was aware of the presence of the other till it was too late to prevent collision. Both cars turned over.

The injured were Mrs. John McIsaac, Iona, who sustained lacerations of the scalp, fractured ribs and bruises about the body, Mr. John McIsaac who received bruises and shock, Rev. C. J. McCarthy who received a scalp wound and an injury to the right shoulder, Vincent Connolly who is suffering from shock, and Wilfred Doucette who is suffering from a scalp wound and shock.

Medical aid was summoned, and the injured are reported to be resting comfortably.

Celebrates Her 104th Birthday
