Scout News and Notices

Under the terms of the will of the late A. C. Mendenhall of Lethbridge, Alta., the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of the city were left \$600.

King Farouk of Egypt, who is Chief Scout of his country recently attended Scout show staged by nine different nationalities. The visit of the King marked the 12th anniversary of his investiture as a Scout.

Before their meeting recently the London County Council of the Boy Scouts held a thanksgiving service in nearby churches to mark the end of hostilities.

The death has occurred at McGrath, Alta., of Mrs. Louis Alston, said to be the first lady Scoutmaster in Canada. She was decorated with the Medal of Merit by the late Lord Tweeddale in recognition of her services to the Boy Scout Movement.

Brigadier Lorne Campbell, V. C., has been appointed by the Chief Scout of the British Empire and Field Marshal Montgomery to go to Germany to survey the possibilities of re-establishing the Boy Scout Movement in that country. Brigadier Campbell has been a member of the Scout Movement for 17 years.

Lord Roseberry: "If I were to form the highest ideal for my country, it would be this: That it should be a nation of which the manhood was exclusively composed of those who have been or were Boy Scouts and were trained on the Boy Scout theory. Such a nation would be the honour of mankind, it would be the greatest moral force the world has ever known."

When a state of emergency was declared in Trinidad and Tobago, and all police were called away, every Scout between the ages of 12 and 18 was enrolled as a special constable. They carried out police and fireman's duties, coast guard and other duties. As a reward the Government has awarded the Scouts a new site for their island headquarters.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—(CP)—The apparent consumption of alcoholic beverages was higher during the fiscal year ended last March than in the preceding year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported last night. Giving figures from a survey it conducted the Bureau said

sumption of spirituous liquor during the 12 months ended March, 1948, was approximately 3,720,000 proof gallons compared with 3,444,000 gallons in the preceding year. Beer consumption approximated 110,224,000 gallons compared with 3,712,000 gallons compared with 3,594,000. Proof spirits produced in Canada during the fiscal year ended March 1948, moved up to 35,585,000 gallons from 27,203,000 in the preceding year, while the output of beer advanced to 122,500,000 gallons from 104,032,000.
