27 Fatalities In Eastern Canada Over Week-end

In the first really warm week-end of the summer, 27 persons lost their lives across eastern Canada through a variety of accidents headed by 15 drownings.

Total Loss Estimated To Be \$38,000

Two general stores, a service station and a warehouse burned in Prince County Saturday, causing loss estimated at approximately \$38,000. The fires were at Miscouche and Elmsdale. Loss in each case was partially covered by insurance. Origin of both fires was unknown.

The first fire was at Miscouche early Saturday morning where the general store, warehouse and service station of Mr. Alfred Gaudet was leveled. The entire stock of merchandise and service station equipment were completely lost as well. The building which was single story construction, housed the store, warehouse and service station and was built last summer. At the time of the fire a heavy stock of merchandise was on hand.

Mr. Gaudet stated that at present he had not the slightest idea as to how the fire started. The store had been closed on Friday night at 10:45 and several people, who passed the store at half past eleven, saw no sign of fire. The blaze was discovered about 12:15 by Mrs. Gaudet and an immediate alarm put through to the Summerside Fire Department and to the nearby airport.

Both brigades were quick to respond and although the store and service station were beyond saving by that time the equipment they brought prevented the fire from spreading to nearby residences.

Mr. Gaudet paid high tribute to the efforts of the two Departments and stated that it was due to them that a number of houses in the vicinity were saved. To the residents of Miscouche and surrounding districts Mr. Gaudet expressed sincere thanks for their valued aid in preventing a further spread of the fire.

It is understood that the estimated loss is about \$15,000, partially covered by insurance.

Mr. Gaudet also informed the Guardian last evening that it is his intention to begin immediate construction of a new store and warehouse on the old site.

At Elmsdale The Elmsdale fire, which broke out shortly before midnight Saturday
