HUDSON-FULTON NAVAL CELEBRATION

Great Spectacular Scenes Reproducing the Discovery of the River Hudson.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(Special.)—Henry Hudson, who disappeared from view three hundred years ago, walked his quaint deck Saturday, and, on a beautiful river named after him, surveyed from his ship, the Half Moon, such changes in navigation as three centuries have wrought. The reproduction of Hudson's vessels and Fulton's steamers Clermont were perfect in every detail.

MANAGEMENT SHIFTS TO MONTREAL
