No Reply from Moscow Government

LONDON, August 13.—Lloyd George last evening notified Leo Kamenetz, Soviet emissary here, that the Polish government had just informed the British premier that up to nine p.m. Tuesday, Poland had not received a reply from the Moscow government to the message of Poland expressing a willingness to send delegates to the armistice and peace conference at Minsk. Poland informed the British premier that the Polish officer commanding the sector beyond Siedlce had just announced that the Russian peace delegation had arrived in that sector and not finding the Polish delegates, had sent General Wladyslaw Jablonski to the Russian premier further to inform Kamenetz that Poland replied that the Polish delegation was proceeding to the front to meet the Russians and that if the Russian delegates were still there the Poles would send their peace delegation immediately.

Not until we work for the very joy of accomplishing, not until we feel the thrill that comes from the doing of our very best just for the sake of growing inwardly, can we know the sweetest reward of faithful effort.

Fox and Fur Notes



A wonderful change has come over the Fox Ranchers of this Province. A few years ago it was a difficult matter to secure a five dollar subscription fee to an Association. Today, the same men freely subscribed anywhere from two hundred to two thousand dollars in the Fur Selling Association. This Association has taken a hold over the Foxmen. It is what they have been wanting and the proposition is being received with open arms. The canvassers are meeting with phenomenal success, and it is only a matter of a few days before the Organization meeting will be called. Never before has a proposition to safeguard and insure the future of the Fox industry, been received with such favor, and the promoters are to be congratulated on the initiative and courage they have shown. There were the doubting Thomases who prophesied that in theory it was alright, but that the money could not be secured, that when it came to putting up the money, the ranchers would not come across. Well, this has been overcome by the fact that in ninety per cent. of the ranchers canvassed have subscribed to the full limit of fifty dollars per old pair of foxes. These subscriptions range from one share to twenty shares. At least three companies have subscribed two thousand dollars each, while a number of others have subscribed one thousand, five hundred, and fifteen hundred dollars each. The proposition is going with a swing, and the promoters have now no hesitation in announcing that the capital necessary to organize will be secured within a few days.

Never before in the history of the Fox industry in this Province has there been such a genuine movement towards Co-operation. The fact that ranchers are subscribing freely in sums ranging from one hundred to two thousand dollars each is the best proof that they realize, as never before, the necessity for union.

This is going to be the biggest and best movement that has ever taken place. It is making history. It is making a mile gone in the industry. The Silver Fox Fur Selling Association has now past the doubtful stage, it is assuming tangible form, subscriptions are fast coming in. In fact about thirty different ranchers have subscribed within the last forty-eight hours. In a few more days the advertisement calling the organization meeting will be published. These who wish to have a voice at this meeting have no time to lose if they wish to participate. They must act and act quickly. "Time and tide wait for no man," and as this Association has important work to do, as soon as the necessary amount is subscribed it can't afford to wait on the laggards.

When the project of the formation of The Silver Fox Fur Selling Association was placed before the public, some said, "Well the scheme is all right, it is good but there are great difficulties ahead, you will find that the ranchers will approve but when it comes to putting up the money, that will be a difficult story!" Now we had enough faith to believe that when we came to the rancher with a good thing for themselves, they would see it. It took publicity and education to do it but only faith has been proved. The ranchers are coming across. They are doing their full duty, ninety per cent. of them, what better can you ask. The Silver Fox Fur Selling Association is here to stay, its future is assured. The promoters and the ranchers who have initiated the project and are so successfully putting it through are to be congratulated.

STATE DOCUMENTS HAVE DISAPPEARED

BERLIN, August 12.—A most amazing theft of important state documents from a diplomatic courier is troubling the German foreign office tonight and a frantic hunt for the missing papers has been organized. The documents are supposed to deal with the Polish war and are considered of the utmost importance.

They were being transported by a courier from Paris, who was carrying four parcels. He gave two to a legitimate official who was supposed to accept the other two afterwards. Meanwhile an unknown man, presented a forged receipt, took the parcels and vanished. All investigation so far has proved fruitless.

The robbery is considered most extraordinary in view of the precautions sometimes humorously exaggerated, usually taken by the German foreign office.

TRURO, Aug. 13.—The United Farmer's Party, Colchester, held a convention here last evening and nominated Capt. Hugh A. Dickson of Ohslow to oppose the Hon. McCurdy, Minister of Public Works at the bye-election. Capt. 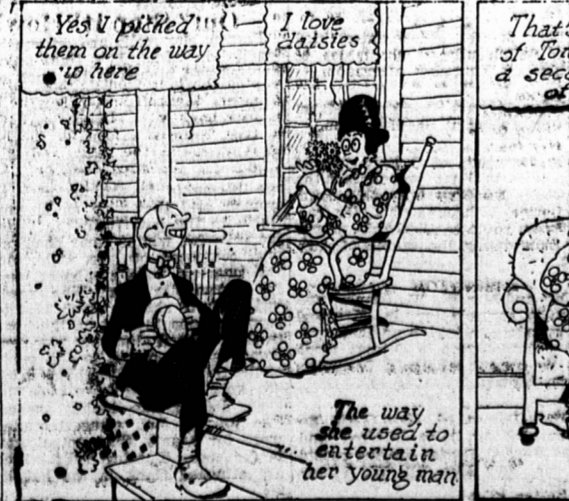
