BUCKINGHAM STRIKE TROUBLE

Murder Charge Against Mill Owners Dismissed—Chief of Police Dismissed.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Janet and Alex. McLaren, Manager Valille of the Buckingham mills, Chief of Police Kiernan, Bailiff J. C. Cummings, James Kiernan, James Cameron and Philomet Fournier appeared before Judge Seguin this morning to answer a charge of attempted murder.

Henry Ayles, their counsel, asked that the case be dismissed as the declaration on which the warrants had been issued was defective as it did not give the date of the offence. The case was dismissed.

Last night a warrant was sworn out by Jos. Gagnon for the arrest of Chief Kiernan of the Buckingham police for murder. The hearing of this case was postponed for eight days.

It is understood that a week ago the officers of the federal Labor Department and of the Quebec Labor Department, were referred to MacLarens of Buckingham and their employes to bring about a settlement of the differences between them and avert trouble.

The men accepted to him offers but the mill owners declined to permit the intervention of the authorities in the dispute.

PROVINCES WIN NEW SUBSIDIES

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The Provincial Premiers expect to close a successful mission to-morrow and leave for their several homes with the assurance of the Federal Government that subsidies will be increased.

This morning a resolution endorsing the Quebec application for subsidy increase without prejudice to the right of any Province to ask for special consideration was laid before Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues. The Government is considering it and will give an answer to-morrow.

Details of the fishing settlement will be probably left to a later settlement, if the Provinces on receiving an increased allowance will abolish commercial traveller's taxes.

At the present time these taxes are imposed by the Provinces of British Columbia, Quebec and Prince Edward Island. They have resulted in Canada being a good deal criticized.

Sir Wilfrid has told the Provincial Premiers that he would like to have the question of divided jurisdiction over the fisheries of Canada settled by giving the Dominion complete control.

LEVEL CROSSING COSTS A LIFE

Teamster Killed Near Westfield, His Body Thrown Forty Yards

ST. JOHN, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Theodore Purdy Hampton was struck and killed by the Atlantic express near Westfield this morning.

At the time he was driving a shingle-laden sledge, drawn by a pair of horses, and with him on the driving seat was William Langstroth, Hampton, contractor.

Mr Langstroth jumped the moment before the engine crashed into the sledge and was uninjured.

His companion however, tried to urge the horses across the track and paid for his efforts with his life. His body was thrown about forty yards from the rails.

MEN ARRESTED KILLED STRIKERS

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—(Special.)—The Quebec Government has taken steps to investigate the killing of two strikers and injury of several more in the fight of the police and strike-breakers at Buckingham last night.

At the same time efforts are being made to effect a reconciliation between employers and strikers.

This afternoon warrants were sworn out at Hull for the arrest of James and Alexander MacLaren, owners of Buckingham mills on a charge of murder.

The police left tonight to make the arrests.

A troop of Royal Canadian Dragoons has been sent to Buckingham to keep order.

DISASTROUS FIRE THREATENS TO DEVASTATE SUMMERSIDE

A few notes rang out from the fire bell this morning shortly after 1 o'clock. It was not the regular alarm denoting the number of the ward—and those who heard it were puzzled.

It was with feelings of profound regret that it was learned that the firemen were called out in answer to an appeal from the Mayor of Summerside for aid to fight a disastrous fire which threatened to destroy that City.

Very promptly the willing firemen gathered at the City Hall. Here Mayor Eaton, Councillor McDonald, Assistant Chief of the fire department had assembled with other citizens all anxious to do what was possible in response to the request for help.

Chief Ronaghan had no difficulty in securing volunteers. In remarkable

short time the steam fire engine and hose reels were taken down to the railway where an engine and flat car had been got in readiness to take the men and their apparatus to Summerside.

Superintendent Sharp was on the scene very shortly after the railway telegraph had received the message from Summerside. Trainmen, linemen and the crew for the journey were quickly summoned and at two o'clock the train drew out of the station.

Here while the train was being made ready a number of citizens of Summerside who had learned the news gathered and their anxious faces showed the fear they felt for their property and relatives in the threatened town.

In the meantime efforts to obtain news

from Summerside by either telephone or telegraph were met with the reply "no communication. Offices believed to be burned down." After repeated efforts on the part of The Guardian the Summerside manager of the Telephone Co., answered a call and conveyed the first information of the great extent of the fire. At that time it had cut a swath through the city from the railway freight shed to the Post Office and the latter building was then on fire and the Russ Hotel in danger.

The following Charlottetown firemen left on the train Chief Ronaghan, Thos. Wakeling, E. Hearts, R. B. Rattray, T. Howatt, Jas. Connolly, A. Trainor, James McMillan, Wm. Martin, S. McKearney, G. Goudin, J. Turner, B. Large, H. Matheson.

Mayor Eaton received the following telegram at 12.25. "Our town is in flames. Can you send an assistance immediately." H. H. COMPTON, Mayor.

At half past three a telephone message from Summerside told the Guardian that up to that time forty two buildings had been destroyed.

Included among these are the Baptist Church, the Church of England, the Russ Hotel, the Strathcona Hotel, the Plaza Hotel, the Charles Hotel, and the Railway Freight shed where the fire started.

The fire Postoffice was also burned. The fire was first noticed at ten o'clock last night and the apparatus of the Summerside fire brigade was brought to bear upon them.

But a fierce gale was blowing from the south east, getting gradually stronger.

The fire spread despite efforts of everybody to check it, and it soon assumed such proportions as to make certain it could not be fought without assistance.

Mayor Compton telegraphed Mayor Eaton as above related. There are many small dwellings in addition to the above which have been consumed.

Up to the time of The Guardian going to press the situation was unchanged and Summerside was looking anxiously for the arrival of the train from the city.

The gale had increased in violence and there was very little prospect of the fire being overcome by human power.

THIRD DAY OF THE EXHIBITION AND RACES

Marked By a Large Attendance—The Day Fine and Warm Good Horse Racing and Other Attractions Judging of the Exhibits—Names of Prize Winners

THE second day of the horse races drew an immense crowd. The races were of the one, two, three order, and little difficulty was found in selecting the winners after the first heat of each was run off. A strong breeze of wind blowing up the stretch prevented fast time. The officials were the same as yesterday namely: Starter, Dr. Reid, Guelph; Ont. Judges, Dr. Reid, Guelph; Dr. F. S. McDonald, Souris; W. S. Hooper, Fredericton, N. B. Distance Judge, P. I. McMahon. Clerk of the Course, C. E. McKinnon.

2.10 CLASS—1ST HEAT. There were only three starters in this race, Claudia Hal, Joe Patchen, Jr., and Rita M., drawing positions in the above order, Patchen and Parker L. being scratched. This heat was a procession throughout, Rita M. leading as they went round the first turn, with Claudia Hal second, and Patchen third. These positions were maintained throughout. Patchen made two losing breaks, and was well to the rear in the finish. Time, 2:23.

THREE YEAR OLD STAKE—FIRST HEAT. There were four starters in this class, Maid's King, Dr. George Mills, See See, and Devilish Dorothy. Maid's King had the pole. After repeated scoring due largely to See See being unable to get away with the rest they were finally sent off to a good start. Maid's King at once forged ahead, with Devilish Dorothy on her wheel, Dr. Mills falling in third and See See fourth. Maid's King and Dorothy trotting well together, soon left Mills about six lengths behind. Dorothy disputed every inch of the heat with Maid's King, but the bay mare held her lead and finished about one length ahead of Dorothy. Dr. Mills was about five lengths behind the leader. See See was on the wrong side of the flag at the close. Time 2:47.

THREE-MINUTE CLASS—FIRST HEAT. Parklawn, Regal Pandect, Guy Fawkes and Miss Minto, Parkola and Flying Eagle, answered the bell in this class, and were given positions as above. This was a race from wire to wire. Parklawn took the lead, rounding the first turn. Regal second and Miss Minto third, well

knocked together, Guy Fawkes fourth, Eagle fifth and Parkola sixth. They finished the first half in this order. Going up the stretch on the second round Regal shot to the front, and Miss Minto also went by Parklawn. 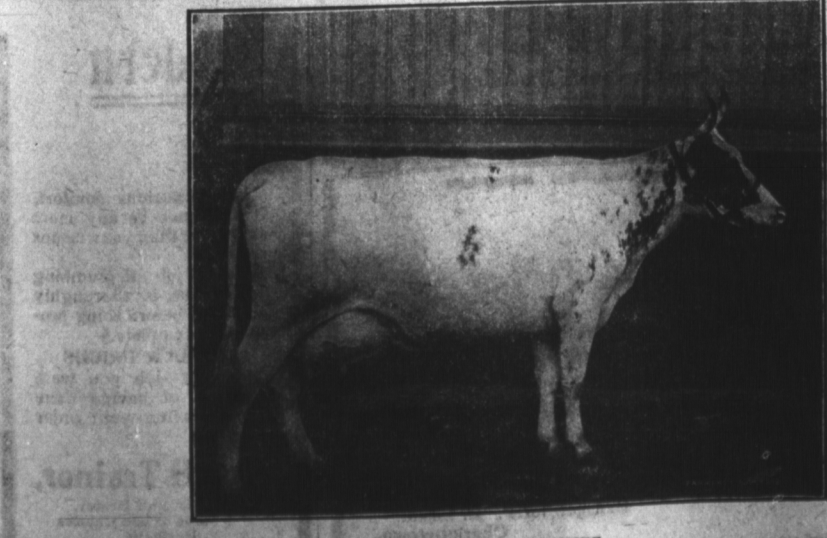
