HALIFAX, July 18.—"Lady Lena" a barred Plymouth Rock hen, registered at the Dominion Experimental Farm at Kentville, N. S., as No. 63, laid 104 eggs in 104 days and is the Halifax Morning Chronicle and Argyle, the champion of the world. "Lady Lena" was hatched in 1919 and began her egg-laying career in November of the same year. She did not begin her record non-stop lay until February 13, 1920, however. On that day she laid her habitual eggs, and on every day thereafter until May 23, she repeated. During 1920 she paid for her board with 246 eggs.

Japan Facing Crisis Over Disarmament

TOKIO, July 16.—Japan today seems an empire divided on the great issues created by the summations of President Harding to a conference on disarmament and Far East problems. On one side, largely in the ranks of the proposed conference will be dominated by the Anglo-Saxons and may result in strangling Japan's political economic development in Asia.

On the other side is a powerful Liberal group, which demands that Japan enter into the deliberations fearlessly, submitting her wants resolutely, combating for them with confidence and not opposing just claims. Hagglings and bickering, they insist, will ruin the cause of Japan.

Both camps agree that Japan is facing a crisis, requiring tact and largeness of vision. Many members of the Privy Council, according to the well informed Chugia Shogyo Shimp are pessimistic about the committee; and they contend that the proposal to discuss problems and policies of the Far east indicates co-operation between the United States and Great Britain in an attempt to settle international questions favorably for themselves, an indication of which was to be seen in the attitude of the English toward the Anglo Japanese alliance.

U.S. Shipping Board Short \$280,000,000

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Operations of the United States Shipping Board's fleet for the fiscal year just ended resulted in a loss of approximately \$280,000,000, Chairman Lasker of the board announced today. This deficit was greater by \$307,000,000 than was estimated.

The government's venture in the merchant marine business last year involved a total expenditure of \$688,000,000 so far as could be ascertained from the board's books which Mr. Lasker described as in bad shape.

The new chairman estimated that it would cost the government \$300,000,000 to carry on operation of the fleet this year. In saying that an examination
