or stirring up of the shells in the bed was necessary for removing slime and sediment which collects during the close season.

Mr. Lund contended that oysters could not be grown on barren bottoms except on the depleted beds.

Mr. Herbert Inman in reply to this referred to his recent visit to one of the largest companies off Rhode Island where he had seen on cultivated areas 500 barrels raised by machinery in the day. Reference was also made to the private beds of Sharp Bros., of Hibernia who have successfully built up oyster beds on deep muddy bottom. Those beds are giving large and satisfactory results to their owners.

Mr. Jas. McInnis said he was very much opposed to the leasing of oyster beds, and expressed his doubts about these companies being able after three months' operations, to ship oysters in quantity inferring that these oysters had been taken from the public beds.

Mr. Thos. McNutt assured the meeting that the company he represented which was the largest shipper of oysters this season had imported their stock from the United States, a quantity of which was four years old, and therefore fully developed for the market this fall. He asked them all to believe that they had not been shipping F. E. I. oysters.

Mr. Herbert Inman, on behalf of the company of which he is manager, The Standard Cup Oyster Company, endorsed Mr. McNutt's remarks with reference to the shipping of oysters.

## TEACHERS' CONVENTION

(Continued from page one.)

that upheld, supported and sympathized with the work of the school; fourth National Recognition, and fifth the imparting of Religious Instruction. A pleasing feature in connection with the convention was the excellent rendering of it. So clearly and distinctly was it read as to be plainly heard in all parts of the hall. Prof. W. D. Tait, Ph.D., of McGill University was the next speaker. His subject was Psychology and Education. From the fact that Prof. Tait has made a specialty of Psychology as applied to Education a thorough treatment of the subject was anticipated and fully realized. He pointed out the distinction between the old psychology and the new, defining the new psychology as being the study of human conduct as it is. In elaborating his subject he dealt principally with attention and memory as these are the qualities most needed in the educational process. Following this thoughtful and scholarly address there was an animated discussion during which a great number of questions were asked the professor which were cleverly and satisfactorily answered. After tendering the speaker a vote of thanks the convention adjourned to meet at 8 o'clock p. m.

## THE ABNORMAL CHILD.

There was another session at night which was largely attended at the previous meetings. Dr. Anderson presided, and also present on the platform were the Premier, Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Rev. Dr. Fullerton, Professor W. D. Tait, Ph.D., of McGill University, Mr. R. H. Campbell, Superintendent of Education and President of the Association, Inspectors Devereux, Boulter and Mullin, Professor Shaw and Messrs. J. Anderson and J. D. Seaman.

The principal proceeding at the meeting was an address by Professor Tait on the place of the school in society and the physiological problem of the abnormal child. The function of the school, he said, was not merely to make the pupils acquainted with the subjects of the curriculum but rather to aim at social efficiency and to fit the young man and the young woman for the duties of life. The particular type of the abnormal child that he dealt with was the feeble-minded. Feeble-mindedness was congenital. By actual investigation it had been conclusively proved that eighty per cent. of feeble-mindedness was hereditary and that the same percentage was incurable. It was the most dangerous class of society, and as psychologists put it, every feeble-minded person was an incipient criminal. Delinquency in the largest degree sprang from feeble-mindedness. The necessity existed for the proper tackling of the problem of how to treat the feeble-minded boy or girl. The question was how they were to face the problem. The delinquent boy and girl were better off on the streets than in the school, where it would only mean further discussion followed many remarks pertinent to the questions under discussion and much interesting information elicited.

Hon. A. E. Arsenault showed in glowing terms the possibilities in wealth to the people of P. E. Island, the fishermen and companies alike if this business could be made a success and appealed to the fishermen and companies to co-operate in the prosecution of the industry, pointing out that the fishermen themselves had the opportunity of taking up valuable areas when money would easily be forthcoming from the capitalists for developing the same, the fishermen's time and labor being counted as part of the capital.

It was felt, in view of so many questions coming up for consideration, advisable to hold a further meeting with a view to forming an oystermen's association.

The Chairman (Hon. Tanton) expressed his commendation of the development of the oyster industry, stating that he had great expectations from the development of these barren areas under the leasing system. As shipper of oysters of thirty years' standing he appreciated the importance to both fishermen and the Island of such conservations as was being carried out by the government.

The motion was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

The Committee appointed consists of Messrs. McQuillan, Inman, Ross and McNutt.

that they would corrupt the normal boy and girl, and spread crime and immorality. The question must be tackled in the school. First of all there must be a compulsory school law and its rigid enforcement, and then means must be provided for the mental and physical examination of every child. Having found out which were the feeble-minded, means must be provided for their care. They must either be sterilized or placed in institutions. As regards the former method they had not yet advanced sufficiently for that. Therefore, he advocated the provision of institutions for the feeble-minded. It would mean the stopping of the greatest source of crime and immorality and be of the greatest benefit to the community.

The Premier after fitting reference to the great educational work of the chairman, said, with regard to the doctrine advanced by Professor Tait, that while it was a problem worthy of the most careful consideration, he did not think that at this juncture it should be a burden added to the problems which the teachers already had to face in the performance of their work. He remained upon the fact that there were evidences of a great educational awakening in this island, and said that it was a splendid thing, and of the greatest gratification to everyone in the province. He was confident that there would now be a steady advance in the interest of the teachers in their work. He hoped the result of the convention would be added interest and added qualification to the teachers present to do better work in the future.

Dr. Fullerton also spoke and referred to the importance of education, and said he wished every teacher to feel that the preacher in the pulpit was not doing a more important and solemn work for the individual and nation than they in their teaching were doing when they were instilling moral principles in the minds of the rising generation. The true theory of education was to train for the high manhood and womanhood. He trusted that they would receive great inspiration from their convention and that they would return to their work instilled with a deeper interest in its performance for the glory of God and the good of man.

In the course of the proceedings Miss Bertha Gorman gave a very interesting recital, entitled "The Little Rebel," and Miss McDonald played an excellent violin solo.

## CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.

The C.P.R. has issued much "safety first" literature in connection with this subject of discipline and safety to the general travelling public.

In a series of printed resolutions, which it has circulated far and wide among the men and others, there are set forth regulations in respect of maintaining a safe and prudent attitude. Such as: "I will not stand in front of moving car, or engine"; "I will always respect the blue flag because the lives of my fellow-employees depend on it," and so forth.

The company warns all employees not to take a chance. It asks them in capital letters to consider safety the first rule of action. And all this as having its effect.

For, as one of the officials said, "While we must have rules and rigid rules you must get the co-operation of the men, and you can only get that by persuasion. It is the spirit you must make appeal to and that is really dearer than discipline. You must get the assent of the man. It is not formal obedience so much as the whole attitude of the man toward rules. Improve that attitude."
