A Brilliant Reception To Governor General

(Continued from page one.)

Your Excellency and share our greetings.

Again extending a most heartfelt welcome to this Our Island Province.

His Excellency making reply conjointly to both addresses expressed his gratitude for the cordiality of the welcome extended to him upon this his first visit to Prince Edward Island and for the addresses just read. It gave him pleasure indeed to reply to such addresses the outstanding feature of which was a spirit of loyalty, strength and confidence.

In reference to the allusions in these addresses regarding the period of the year in which his visit happened to take place His Excellency declared that whatever differences the weather conditions might make in the way of a welcome to him was more than compensated for in the warmth of the welcome accorded him. He declared however his intention of taking the first opportunity of visiting this Province at a time when it is garbed in the full beauty for which it is so famous and that when this opportunity came that he would have the pleasure of bringing the Duchess with him.

He added that his visit this time was not so much to see the country as to meet the people of the island personally and of expressing thanks to them on behalf of His Majesty for the splendid part the sons of the Province have taken in the war. The Empire he said had emerged from the war stronger than ever with its various parts more closely knit together than ever.

Referring briefly to his trip across the Strait he said he could not but think of the shortness of the distance separating the island from the Mainland. The fact that throughout the whole four years of devastation caused by the war this Province had uninterrupted communication with the territory beyond reminded him of the great work achieved by the British fleet. This splendid force had preserved us from menace. But for the long arm of the British navy it would have been but a short matter of days until this Province would have been isolated and at the mercy of the German Emperor.

His Excellency paid a glowing tribute to the men of this Province and to the women as well who by their great and noble work had backed up the glorious work of our heroes in the field. Thousands of homes today are mourning the loss of loved ones who can never be replaced. The knowledge of the great results attained through their sacrifice would be some consolation to those who mourn. He dwelt then upon the different phases of the war and the great good which will now result since victory has dawned upon the world. The war has been fought and won and our record can be looked upon with justifiable pride.

It was not through any spirit of aggrandisement on our part that we entered the struggle, said His Excellency. We are a peace-loving people with no wish to interfere with others in the working out of their destiny. We entered the conflict through the dictates of honor and the duty. In 1914 we saw that an attack was being made which if unchallenged would fundamentally alter conditions of the whole civilized world, when might would over-rule right and we would be at the mercy of a military organization which would dominate us in everything.

Not only has the war been fought to a conclusion, said His Excellency, but we trust and believe that never again will such a hideous outrage be permitted against civilization and humanity.

Not only has victory been achieved at the rights of justice, and humanity have been vindicated. While ancient dynasties are falling in Europe and Kings and Emperors are abdicating we can look back with pride and gratitude that British Institutions have successfully withstood the vast upheavals throughout the world. While other monarchs were abdicating our King and Queen were down among their people and joined heart and soul with them in their devotion to God for the great victory vouchsafed to us. The British monarchy through it all today stands firmer and truer than ever before.

Great Britain, he said, by strength of character left her system of government broad and with true principles and as a result came through the trying period with honor and the fullest confidence.

He was proud upon this occasion, he said, to stand in one of the chambers, where the fathers of our country had helped to make the Empire. The Institutions founded so truly would

stand the test of time and the machinery "would carry on" to meet successfully the ever changing requirements of time and circumstances.

Referring to Canada he said it was a land possessing unequalled possibilities and unsurpassed resources. By devotion to our country we can look forward to making the great country infinitely greater. If the same spirit as shown in the last four years is brought to bear we can look with every confidence to the future.
