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## Finals Reached In Nova Scotia Tennis Tourney

### Commander Edwards And Douglas Grant To Battle In Men's Singles For Provincial Title — Edwards Is P.E.I. Champ.

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 18—For the second time in two weeks Commander J. O. Edwards of Ottawa will meet young Douglas Grant of Halifax for a provincial tennis championship. With the Prince Edward Island title won, the Commander entered the final Nova Scotia match today by eliminating brilliant Hugh MacLennan of Halifax in straight sets, 6-3, 6-1, 6-1, while Grant qualified as his opponent again by defeating Hon. Peter Aitken of Liverpool in a gruelling five-set match, 3-6, 6-3, 5-7, 6-1, 6-4.

Edwards and Grant will battle for the championship tomorrow.

#### Men's Doubles

Harry Roper and Bev. Piers, of Halifax, defending men's doubles champions, met their Waterloo today when they were beaten in four sets by the Montreal combination of Bob Barnard and Charlie Peters. The scores were 5-7, 7-5, 7-5, 6-1. Barnard and Peters will now meet the winner of the Aitken and Condon vs. Edwards and Christie match in the finals.

#### Women's Singles

Mrs. J. C. Edwards, of Ottawa, and Mrs. H. L. Beer, of Ottawa, will fight it out for the women's singles crown by virtue of their respective wins over Mrs. F. V. Woodbury and Mrs. Harold Jones, both of Halifax. Mrs. Edwards defeated Mrs. F. V. Woodbury by scores of 6-4, 6-3, while Mrs. Beer bested Mrs. Jones, 6-3, 6-0.

#### Women's Doubles

The women's doubles will be at stake between three Ottawa players and one Halifax player with Mrs. H. L. Beer and Miss F. Rykert, Ottawa, playing Mrs. H. Jones, Halifax, and Mrs. J. C. Edwards, Ottawa. Today Mrs. Beer and Miss Rykert eliminated the last Halifax combination of Mrs. Roper and Mrs. Woodbury in straight sets by scores of 6-1, 6-3, while on the other side of the draw Mrs. Edwards and Mrs. Jones scored a straight set victory over the young combination of Miss Jean Wright, of Bridgewater, and Miss K. Doyle, of Halifax, 6-4, 6-4. The playing of Miss Doyle and Miss Wright has been one of the features of the tournament and they gave their much more experienced opponents a battle royal before being beaten.

#### Mixed Doubles

Bev. Piers and Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax, scored an upset in the mixed doubles event by beating the noted team of Eddie Condon and Mrs. H. L. Beer, champions of P. E. I., in three sets by scores of

6-2, 4-6, 6-3. Condon and Mrs. Beer were the favorites to take this event but they fell victims to the superior play of the Halifaxians. Condon and Mrs. Beer were finalists in the Eastern Canada tournament last year.

#### Edwards Steady

Commander Edwards, playing a steady game without errors proved far too good for MacLennan and took the first three sets in the match with the loss of only five games. MacLennan was hitting the ball with great speed but it availed him nothing against the stonewall playing of the Commander. Edwards and Grant will in all probability play the final of the singles in the morning. These two players met last week in the finals of the P. E. I. tournament with the Commander winning in three straight sets.

The men's doubles semi-final match gave the gallery plenty of thrills for the first three sets with first one team and then the other leading. All four players were volleying and driving well. In the fourth set however Piers and Roper fell off badly in their play and Peters and Barnard quickly ran out the match winning the fourth set 6-1.

Commander and Mrs. Edwards gained the finals of the mixed doubles event by scoring two straight set victories over, first, Hugh MacLennan and Mrs. H. Jones, Halifax, by scores of 6-4, 6-2 and later C. Peters and Miss E. Billing, Montreal, 6-3, 6-1. They will now meet Bev. Piers and Mrs. F. V. Woodbury in the finals.

Y., Aug. 18—The quarter final round of the women's national tennis championships broke up in a thunder shower today after Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Calif., the defending champion, and Dorothy Round, Eng- land's best bet, had turned in stirring victories to qualify for the final four.

Miss Jacobs, putting up a dramatic defense of her title, had triumphed over Josephine Cruickshank of Santa Ana, Calif., 11-9, 6-4, in a match that lasted an hour and a half, and Miss Round had gained a stubbornly contested victory over Sarah Palfrey of Boston by scores of 6-4, 9-7, when the rain swept the stadium courts.

After a few minutes wait, when it became evident the weather gods really meant business, it was decided to postpone the remaining matches between Mrs. Helen Willis Moody of this country and Mary Heeley of Great Britain, and Petty Nurth of England, and Alice Marble of San Francisco, until tomorrow. The semi-final between the Misses Round and Jacobs also might be played tomorrow, as well as the quarter-final round of doubles.

"I am very happy to observe an advertisement regarding the Crapaud Annual Meeting. Great credit is due to that settlement for its unremitting assiduity to every object of improvement. By those exertions the place which had but five or six years ago been scarcely known as a settlement, is now acquiring a high character as such; the race course for its dimensions, a mile round, is probably not surpassed anywhere as a sporting ground and I am glad to observe after a late visit there that some brush which intercepted part of the view around has been completely removed."

"Mr. Scott's mare continues to be the favorite. It is said, however, that she will meet her match at the ensuing meeting. The breeding of good horses should be encouraged in this Island, even for agricultural purposes." Reference to the above race, we could not find it reported anywhere in the Register.

An advertisement the same date reads: "Crapaud—Annual Meeting—will be held at Westmorland of Crapaud Harbor on Tuesday the 23rd of September, 1823, and the following day. Horse and boat races with other amusements. A public dinner and music for the evening as usual. The inhabitants of the above settlement are anxious to open a market with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Young cattle of the best kind from Cumberland would meet with purchasers, for cash or barter. Several persons from distant parts of the Island have signified their intention of attending for the above purpose."
