THIRD RACE FOR CORONATION CUP

SYDNEY, C. B., Sept. 11.—The third and deciding race of the Coronation cup series between the Royal Yacht Club Yacht Club defender Cibou and the Charlottetown challenger Cabot, was sailed Saturday afternoon over an 18-mile course and won by the Sydney boat. In 8 minutes and 24 seconds, being at a mile and a quarter in the lead when she crossed the line.

The wind was from the southeast and blew at an average of about nine miles an hour, though once or twice it dropped down to about five or six miles. The start was from opposite the club house. Immediately on firing of the starting gun, the Cibou squared across and hung down on the course to leeward of the French war-ships riding at anchor in front of the city. The Cabot jibed a ross about a minute behind the other, but went to windward of the ship and flung out her spinnaker and balloon jib, went down the course at a rapid pace and kept gradually closing the distance between her and the defender.

The Cibou crossed the starting line at 2.15 and the Cabot at 2.16.30. They rounded the first buoy at 2.23 and 2.28.30 respectively. On the second leg they held well together, the Cabot keeping to windward and rounded the second buoy at 2.43.30 and 2.44; they sailed the leg under their reaching sails, but on the third the Cibou threw out her spinnaker and balloon jib and immediately upon getting around and breezes striking her she began to increase her lead, the Cabot carrying only her balloon.

The third buoy was rounded by the Cibou at 3.01.15, the Cabot being then about a quarter of a mile astern. The Cabot jibed round at 3.07 and went close hauled on starboard for the return course. The Cibou had also tacked and being excellently handled, was forging rapidly ahead. When the Cibou came about at the Northwest Arm buoy the Cabot was astern nearly a mile, having lost in tacking from Barrington Point back to Point Edward. On reaching up the arm she made good gain, but unfortunately lost two minutes in rounding the buoy there through poor seamanship. On the home stretch she made good time and closed a breach of a mile and a half to about a mile and a quarter.

The Cibou finished at 4.53.31, and the Cabot at 5.03.53. On the first day the Cibou won by 10 minutes and 27 1/2 seconds; on the second the Cabot met with an accident, necessitating her return to the wharf. Saturday she had a new spar in and did far better work. John Pinard, her owner, informed the Sun that he attributed their defeat to the fact that she had not been properly hauled out, owing to the men on board not being used to her. Asked as to what disposition he would make of her, he said he would leave her here, and next summer would train a crew to sail her.

"Will you challenge next year?" "Yes," he replied, "I shall and I think we shall be in a position to do better work."

The Cibou won the Coronation cup first from the Canada at St. John and then from the Glencairn last year at Sydney.
