Y. M. C. A. WORK IN INDIA

The following letter received by Mr. R. A. Pendleton, General Secretary of the local Y. M. C. A. from Mr. E. C. Norman, Senior Secretary of the International Committee of Y. M. C. A.'s imparts some idea of the great work being accomplished by the "Y" in foreign countries especially in India.

April 12th, 1924

R. A. Pendleton, Esq., General Secretary, Y. M. C. A., Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Dear Mr. Pendleton,

Twenty-five years ago a young man in this locality was converted to Christianity. In the time of his conversion he had a small amount of property and in his zeal to serve the Kingdom of God he began putting this property into the building of a school. Today it occupies five buildings, employs a corps of well-trained teachers, and has 600 pupils.

The children who attend this school come from a radius of six or seven miles, and during the heavy rains, I am told, they are obliged to leave their homes at six o'clock in the morning in order to reach the school by eleven. With the exception of a few who reside in the near vicinity of the school not more than twenty-five are able to bring lunch for a mid-day meal. Thus a great proportion of the six hundred children who attend the school go without food until late in the evening without food. The difficulties of getting to the school and the pangs of hunger do not stand in the way of the education. Such is the desire for learning in this section of India.

The account tree owned by this young man, Mr. Sathianesan, is dedicated to the National Missionary Society. It is the best tree in his possession. Each year the proceeds of this, with that of about five other trees, are dedicated to missionary work in India, in all amounting to about \$50.

The Y. M. C. A. building is situated just opposite this man's school. Mr. Sathianesan who built the school is President of the Y. M. C. A. and has been responsible in part for the erection of the building. This building cost \$133.33 raised by the members themselves, and is the finest in the town aside from the school buildings.

This Y. M. C. A. is affiliated to the National Movement and is one of the most vital and dynamic spots in the whole work. It is the social, athletic and religious centre of the life of this whole community. Members go out in preaching bands and to conduct Sunday Schools. A library is provided and in many ways the members offer their services to the community. There are no paid secretaries.

This work among the villages of India is really an out-reach of the larger city associations which were started first. The Y. M. C. A. is contagious and we are now having to regard the development of such associations rather than promote them simply because we are not able to supervise them all, as we should.

There are about 125 of these small associations in Travancore and Cochin on the west coast of India, the large number being due to the fact that these areas are the home of the old Syrian Christian Church, which dates from the 7th century historically, and by tradition traces its descent from the Apostle Thomas.

Two Secretaries of the International Committee give their time to promoting and supervising the work of these small Associations. As they train volunteer leadership their service is multiplied many times over.

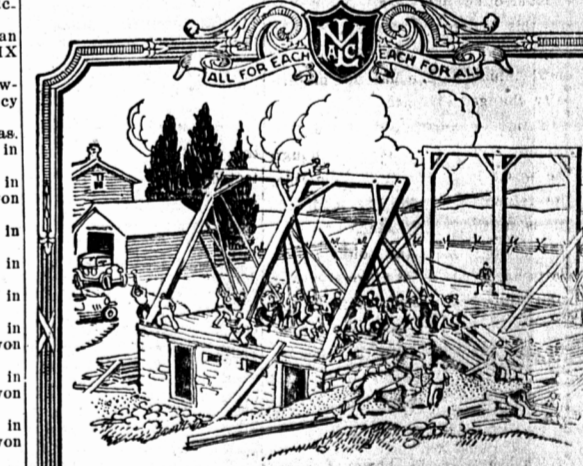
