WOULD NOT BENEFIT NOVA SCOTIA MINES.

General Manager Shields Discusses the Proposed Removal of the American Duty on Coal.

SYDNEY, Jan. 15.—Referring to the report that the duty on coal between Canada and the United States was to be removed or lowered Mr. Cornelius Shields, General Manager of the Dominion Coal Company said to the Chronicle's correspondent to-night that such a move would injuriously affect the coal companies of Nova Scotia. He declared that the bituminous coal companies across the border found their greatest market during the winter months whereas the Nova Scotia Companies shipped the bulk of their coal during the summer.

A conciliatory measure between Canada and the United States would result in the American companies being unable to ship their surplus product during the summer to Montreal and other Upper Canadian Centres which were now shipped by Nova Scotia companies during that season. Mr. Shields said that Ontario and Manitoba would welcome the change with the hope that soft coal would be more plentiful and British Columbia would also welcome it for it would enable that Province to ship its surplus coal products into the United States.

It is the intention of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company to erect two large piers at Sydney. The first one, which will be similar to the present one, will be erected at once near the blast furnaces and will be used to ship the products of the Steel Company. The second will be of steel and will be erected at the lower end of the International Pier. It will be commenced next summer and will be used as a coal shipping pier. The present shipping facilities at the International Pier are inadequate for the growing demands of the Steel and Coal Companies. At times vessels are compelled to lay in the stream for hours before they

can get a berth. The new piers when completed will give employment to about 150 hands.

The last cargo of coal this season for Europe leaves here on Thursday on the S. S. Desjardins Sophia. The vessel will take about 7000 tons which will make in all 25,000 tons shipped to Europe this winter. Dominion Coal Company's coal is in great demand over there, but at the present time the company has only a limited amount for that market.

The Dominion Iron and Steel Company has decided to manufacture rods on a large scale in their mills now under construction. These mills will be in operation about August next.

WHAT OTTAWA THINKS.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—Reports from Washington are that the United States Congress may decide to abolish the United States duty on coal, 67c per long ton for a period of 90 days, in the hope of relieving the coal stringency. The effect of this would be to let Nova Scotia coal cheaper into the States. If this should be done, a question may come up in Canada on reciprocity abolishing the Canadian duty on soft coal. Canada imposes no duty on anthracite, but has a duty on soft coal of 60c per long ton.

The Dominion Parliament will not meet for some weeks yet, so if Parliamentary action is waited for, and Congress should act promptly the ninety day free period first by Congress might be well before Canada could act. A partial move could be made at once, however, by the Dominion Government. The Government is empowered by order-in-council to reduce the Canadian duty to 49c, a ton from 60c, if the United States at any time makes a corresponding (or of course, greater) reduction in the American duty.
