

**APPEAL FROM JUDGMENT**—The Court of Appeals in Equity met Tuesday to hear the case of Ernest Crosby against the estate of Wm. Carpenter. This is an appeal from judgment by the Master of the Rolls affirming the findings of the Master of Chancery. It occupied the whole day. George J. Tweedy and J. O. C. Campbell acted as Counsel for the appellant and W. E. Bentley for respondent. Court adjourned until May 6th, when judgment will be given.

**P. W. C. DEBATE**—"Resolved that final examinations should be discontinued" was the subject debated Tuesday at P. W. C. the pro side winning by a vote of 39 to 29. The speakers for the affirmative were Chas. Bentley, Victoria McLean and Ivan Darraoh, and for the negative Stanhope McLeod, Ben McNeill, and Arthur McKinnon. The pro side suggested that the substitution for exams of short tests held at brief intervals would raise the standard of education. The results of a final examination are no indication of a student's ability as last minute "crumming" is then possible. It was contended by the con side that exams were the best way to prove a student's ability. Short tests covered only a small part of the work each time, and were therefore but a poor indication of a student's ability to assemble and arrange a large amount of material and that the abolishment of exams was the desire of a group of reformers who wished to reform every established institution of our civilization.

**SURPRISE PARTY SHOWER**—A very pleasant surprise party in the form of an "April Shower" was given on Tuesday, April 1st, by Miss Pearl Howatt in honor of her room-mate, Miss Anna Martin, who is to become the bride of Mr. Dwight Allen in the early fall. **MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE**

Market reports furnished by Greenshields & Co., Montreal, to Stewart Jones & Co., 88 Great George Street, Charlottetown.

Just as settlement played a large part in carrying down the Canadian stock market to levels for many securities far below what actual conditions justified, so improved sentiment had a share in the present upward movement which is gaining ground on an enlarged scale. Probably the fact that wheat touched the dollar mark and has since shown a fairly marked recovery is more favorable as a market factor than if the low level for Canadian wheat had been only, say \$1.10 a bushel, for with the optimism which is inherent in most of us a current price of \$1.17 is treated as a gain of 17 cents from the "low", whereas a \$1.10 would show a gain of only 7 cents a bushel. The current price is the same in both cases but this influence of sentiment is quite different. The decline of silver, lead and zinc prices and the threatened drop in copper to below 18 cents a pound has a depressing effect far beyond the circle of shareholders of the companies most vitally interested, such as Smelters, Noranda, International Nickel, etc. The recovery that has set in in metal prices also influences favorably a fairly wide circle of market followers. The slump in coffee prices with the coincident decline in the milreis, hurt Brazilian Traction sentiment, and the price of the stock reacted and there were all sorts of bear prophecies afloat as to just how far the stock might go down—irrespective of the fact that the milreis has relatively only a small effect on Brazilian Traction's earnings and that the Company itself was in a remarkably strong position. But coffee prices went up a little with increased buying, and the milreis got back close to its old level around 11.90, a new buying came into Brazilian Traction and for days past it has been an impressive leader of Canadian stock transactions. Stock market confidence is largely a matter of sentiment in the case of a considerable portion of traders and investors.

Marked improvements and higher prices characterized the markets in today's trading. After the slight falling off during the past few days prices resumed their upward swing. The market closed with some important gains registered but slightly lower generally than during the day.

We wish again to call attention to the following: Penick & Ford, Brazilian, International Nickel, International Hydro Electric, A and Dominion. We believe that a study of these Companies to be worth while and that they are reasonably priced at current levels.

**Income Tax Return**  
**DUE APRIL 30th**

Every corporation or joint stock company is required to make an Income Tax Return on or before April 30th;

—and to include with this return, cheque or cash for at least 25% of the tax payable.

Failure to make such return renders the delinquent liable to a penalty equal to 5% (five percent) of the tax payable (maximum \$500).

**Use Form T2**

Corporation Income Tax Returns should be made on form T2, which form may be obtained from any Income Tax Inspector or Postmaster.
