Olympic Athletes Ready For Journey

Canadian Track Team Ready To Start On Long Train - Ride To Scene Of Battle At Los Angeles

HAMILTON, July 17—Canada's "expression year" olympic track team, smaller and more select than the Amsterdam games four years ago, rested tonight after a two day period of record breaking before starting the long train ride to the 10th modern olympic scene at Los Angeles and a mighty battle with the world's greatest athletes. Canadian records continued tumbling Saturday, as they had done in the opening event Friday, as track stars from all parts of the country put in their efforts to gain places on the team. They broke three Canadian records on the last day of the trials, equalled another and made it plain that the team is not to be confined to sprint and middle distance events. Distance men, faced with the hardest standards set by the olympic committee, romped home in brilliant fashion, a kid high jumper from Collingwood, Ont., soared to a height that should win Canada points at the games. Young Bert Pearson, the lightning limbed Hamilton schoolboy who achieved a record time in winning the 100 metres Friday, came back with a smashing victory at 200 metres. He equalled Bobby Kerr's year old record of 21 4-5 seconds, a standing performer in the trials. He shot to a spectacular win in the 400 metre final as more than 100 of his fellow townsmen cheered him down the stretch. Pearson's victory, duplicating the feat Percy Williams at the trials four years ago, placed the 18 year old central Collegiate flyer on the first division of the olympic squad with Williams and Harold Wright and Buster Brown, fleet runners from Edmonton. Brown placed second to Pearson in the 400 metre event, followed by Williams and Wright took second in the 800 metre event. Polished Alex Brown of Montreal, blonde chief of the Dominion's middle distance contingent, recorded his second triumph of the trials by speedily home ahead of Phil Edwards, Hamilton olympic club negro ace, in the 800 metres. England Retains The King's Prize

C.F. Bayly, Of Kent Wins Coveted Trophy - All-Round Honors Go To Lt. Burke Of Ottawa.

BISLEY CAMP, England, July 17.—England retains the historic King's prize, classic award for the Empire's crack military marksmen, but Canada's teammen leave the 69th annual meeting of the National Rifle Association with a proud record of achievements.

The King's prize was captured by 55-year-old C. F. Bayly, of Kent, who has been shooting at Bisley for more than a quarter of a century. Firing at the long 900 and 1,000 yard ranges in Saturday's final of the great match, Bayly recorded a remarkable score of 289 out of a possible 300, despite rain and mist which at times almost obscured the targets.

It was the reward of persistence. Bayly had been in the final stage seven times previously, but in all his efforts at the N. R. A.'s great meeting had never before won a major award.

To Lieut. Desmond Burke, of Ottawa, King's prize winner of 1924, go the all-round honors of the meeting which came to a close yesterday. Burke captured the grand and all-comers' aggregate, great test of consistent marksmanship over a wide variety of ranges in a number of individual matches. Burke also won the service rifle championship, taking the challenge cup, gold badge and a nominal cash award.

Two Canadians—Captain J. W. Houlden, of Hamilton and of Sherbrooke, Que., and Sgt. Alec Parnell, of Verdun, Que., entered the final stage of the King's prize with better chances than anyone, for they had the highest totals—146 out of 150—in the second stage on Friday. But the final ranges and the conditions saw four English marksmen forge to the front, Houlden, leading Canada at the end, being in fifth place.

Bayly's score of 289 gave him the King's prize of \$1,250, the National Rifle Association's gold badge and gold medal. Armourer-Sergt. French of the Hertfordshire's with 287 won the second award of \$250. Captain R. Johnson, of the London Rifles, with 285 took third place and \$125; Captain C. Anderson, of the Indian Army with 285 fourth place and \$100; Houlden with 285, fifth place and \$75.

The nine Canadians following Houlden were scattered down the list. Their placings were: Lieut. G. A. Molecey, of Winnipeg, 284, 6th; Sgt. Alec Parnell, 284, 10th; C. E. B. Rusk, Ottawa, 281, was 17th; Lieut. Sweet, of Hamilton, 280, 22nd; A. E. Evans, of Esquimaux, B.C., 278, 35th; T. A. Jensen, of Innisfail, Alta., 278, 36th; Sgt. F. V. Shepherd, Ottawa, 267, 90th; and Lieut. A. C. Lucas, of Toronto, 263, 97th.

The Canadians return to the Dominion with one of the largest aggregations of trophies ever garnered at the Empire's biggest rifle meeting. In addition to Burke's three victories, Company Sergt. ANNUAL RIFLE SHOOT BEGINS TODAY

The team scores in the Moore & MacLeod Ltd. and Corporation matches are compiled and the one making the highest total is the winner of the MacDonald prize.

HAMILTON, Ont., July 17—(By The Canadian Press)—Canada's team for the olympic games at Los Angeles will number approximately 120 men and women, it was announced early this morning after a long meeting of the Canadian Olympic Committee. The women's track squad will be 11 strong, 21 track and field athletes have been selected, five fencers, eight cyclists, seven boxers, seven wrestlers, 20 lacrosse players, seven yachtsmen and an unknown number of oarsmen and swimmers.

Tonight at 6 p. m. the Rovers meet the Falcons in the second game of the second section of the City Baseball League, in what promises to be one of the best games so far this year.


