position will move to repeal the law. We believe the Opposition opposed it when it was enacted. For our part, we hope both parties will unite to repeal it. The Searchlight declares the result of the Souris trial is "most disappointing, and if it is true that all protests are withdrawn, then our public men on both sides emerge from the fray with no honor to themselves and with disgrace to our Province." We quite agree that "saw-offs" of one election petition against another are in most cases immoral and corrupt. But, there is this to be said, that the last provincial election, largely owing to the efforts of the Reform League, was some improvement upon previous elections, and with the election law in its present shape we fail to see how the offenders could be adequately punished, especially as the majority in the Legislature apparently stands ready to whitewash and acquit any persons, other than candidates who may be found guilty of corrupt practices of the courts.

ABDUL HAMID'S PRISON IS HISTORIC GROUND.

Saloniki, so frequently mentioned in recent despatches as the headquarters of the Young Turks, and now the prison city of the deposed Sultan of Turkey, is situated on the Gulf of Saloniki, an arm of the Aegean Sea, about 300 miles due west of Constantinople. It has about 100,000 inhabitants, although a census is never taken in a Mohammedan town. The old city is enclosed with a wall five miles in circumference, famous throughout the Orient.

they had passed on to Athens, need further instructions which were given in the two letters to the Thessalonians. The city in time became all nominally Christian, and many fine church edifices were erected there, since transformed into Mohammedan mosques. Here, too, Cicero spent a portion of his time when, exiled from Rome, thus Abdul Hamid's prison is on historic ground. As it is a principle of Islam that there cannot be too many Sultans alive at the same time, something is very liable to happen to Abdul very shortly.

Montreal has a debt of \$35,740,000 and it is proposed this year to make a large addition thereto. The debt limit as fixed by the Legislature has been exceeded, and permission is now asked for further borrowings. The estimates approved by the city council call for outlays of over \$14,000,000. The interest on Montreal's present debt calls for \$1,357,000 yearly, or more than a quarter of the yearly revenue of the city.

There was a decrease in Canada's exports last year of \$3,446,000 and a decrease of \$60,249,000 in imports last year as compared with the previous year. The imports exceeded the exports by over \$38,000,000.

THE TEACHING OF LEADING AMERICAN COLLEGES.

Harold Bolce in the current number of The Cosmopolitan Magazine supplies the first of a series of three articles on the above topic. It embodies the result of his personal visits to eighteen of the leading universities and colleges from Maine to California, in a number of which he was from time to time entered as a special student, in others where he attended lectures, or interviewed members of the faculty, or consulted official records. And here is, in part what he found, first as to divine authority: "There is scholarly repudiation of all solemn authority. The Decalogue is no more sacred than a syllabus. Everything is subjected to searching analysis. The past has lost its grip on the professor. The ancient prophet is less potent than the new political economy. Nothing is accepted on the ipse dixit of tradition. Olympus and Mount Sinai are twin peaks beautified but not made sacred by mythology. From the college standpoint there are no God-established covenants. What happens at the primaries is more to the point than what took place in Palestine. Time is a laboratory wherein reactions are eternally producing new phases of civilization having changing forms and hues." Next, as to new conception of morality: "They teach young men and young women, plainly, that an immoral act is merely one contrary to the prevailing conceptions of society; and that the daring who defy the code do not offend any Deity, but simply arouse the venom of the majority—the majority that has not yet grasped the new idea. Out of Harvard comes the teaching that "there are no absolute evils" and that the highest ethical life consists at all times in the breaking of rules which have

grown too narrow for the actual case." Other teachings are that the change from one religion to another, heathen or Christian is like getting a new hat; that moral teachings are passing shibboleths; that conceptions of right and wrong are as unstable as styles of dress; that to the man who would get on in the world children are an incumbrance; that there can be and are holier alliances without the marriage bond than within and that the home as an institution is doomed. Such, according to Mr. Bolce, are the teachings of the great institutions of learning in the United States today. It seems an appalling condition of things to persons trained to believe in the Bible and Christianity. All forms of immorality, social vice, easy and frequent divorce, lynchings, murders, perjuries and frauds so widely prevalent in the Republic are natural and legitimate fruits of such teaching. What will the end be?

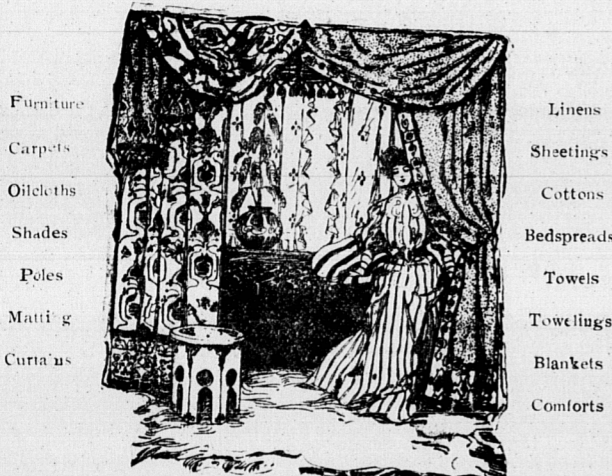
