OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 2.—(Eggs)—Fresh extras are scarce on the majority of Canadian egg markets and value for this grade is working higher.

MONTREAL.—Fresh extras are still very scarce here and are realizing 55-56 in a jobbing way for what few are arriving. Other grades are dull. The consumption of storage wheat continues good.

VANCOUVER.—Dealers here are paying producers extras 49-51, firsts 41-42, pullet extras 34-35. Small pullet eggs 23-24. All eggs are scarce except pullet extras which are moving out satisfactorily. Prices to retailers are extras 55-54, firsts 44-47, pullet extras 40-40. Small pullet eggs 30-31. No fresh eggs are available for carloading and L.C.L. shipments of pullet extras are going to the prairies.

ST. JOHN.—Receipts here are very light and have almost reached the low point for the year. The Quebec white variety is now generally available and is providing good quality firm at a recent advance.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 2.—The export trade in Canadian grain continued quiet here today, there being improvement in the demand for grain in the local market was also slow and little business of importance was accomplished. Prices were unchanged. The market for spring wheat at grades of flour was moderately active and prices were firm. There was no change in
