Busy Programme For Street Dept.

The following report was submitted by Coun. P. C. Dougan, chairman of the street committee, at Monday's meeting of the City Council.

"Our Department is now very busy. After a winter's work we are, at the present time I think, in a position to really give the citizens of this Town a bang-up job in the looking after and maintaining of their streets—dirt, gravel and asphalt.

"The streets have all been graded with our heavy grader and we are now giving them a second coat. Our 3-wheel roller is at work on the old macadamized streets—scarifying them and grading with our Fordson and smaller grader.

"During the past month we have been able to collect from the Service Stations 1,500 gallons of used oil. We would have collected more than this, only we have no storage for any more. This will be used on the streets, more especially after a street has been graded and rolled. We will apply a coat of this oil, and it should be of great benefit.

As a matter of fact, with the recovered sprayer in perfect working order, it might be advisable, a little later on, to negotiate with the Imperial Oil for a car of the proper dust-laying Street Oil. We have been fortunate in obtaining from the County Construction Company, considerable run of the bit gravel, at a very reasonable figure, and this was used to great advantage on Kent Street and Alley Street, which were in such a deplorable state that traffic on these streets was practically impossible.

"When too, on the macadamized streets, before the scarifier is used, all the holes have been filled with College Bridge yellow gravel, which is a coarse gravel with more or less of a cementy loam in it.

"When the streets are finished, I feel that they will not be inclined to have pot holes appear in them, because by the acquisition of this gravel on the required spots, the street has a uniform coat all over it.

The clay streets too, have received some gravel and ashes. The ashes from the P. E. Island Hospital, which are now available to the City, are very similar to the Maritime Electric Co. ashes, and while not as good as gravel, had a great tendency in the Spring of the year, to dry out much holes.

it a particular practice on Saturday of making a thorough clean up of all the sweepers' sections and it is most discouraging to the truck drivers and the officials to find that, after the streets have been thoroughly cleaned, the residents rake their lawns and their yards and in a great many cases, deposit the ashes and tin cans on the street, when they must know that the trucks cannot possibly come around again until the first of the week.

"This is a condition that thoughtful citizens who desire a clean city should take into consideration. It is a practice that has been started only within the last four or five years.

Rubbish Nuisance

"Then too, in the centre of the town, many of the storekeepers sweep their stores right out their front doors. We have placed containers in front of the Bus stop and in front of the restaurants so that persons purchasing chocolate bars, cigarettes, etc. might place the containers in the barrels, but possibly without thinking, they just discard them on the sidewalk or on the streets, and it is most disheartening especially on Sunday mornings, to see so much litter blowing around our main thoroughfares.

"Our men turn out Sunday mornings at 5:30 and they clean down the business section. The papers are all picked up, and the street washed, and about eleven o'clock in the morning it is in a horrible mess. Just what to do about it seems to be a problem, but if those making these Sunday morning purchases would have a little thought, I am sure this unsightly mess would be eliminated.

"There is considerable call for the City to haul ashes, and at this season of the year, with so much work to be done on the hauling of gravel and attending the sweepers, it is practically impossible to have the citizens' ashes hauled.

This would give a seal coat to our streets and would be non-skid. I would recommend that a certain section of this be tried in the City of Charlottetown.
