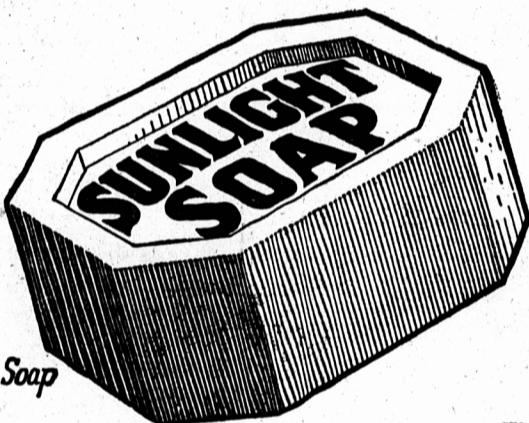

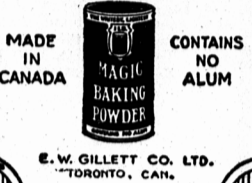

MR. J. B. STRICKLAND

NEW GLASGOW, May 6. — In the death of J. B. Strickland at his home in Trenton there has passed away one of Trenton's leading citizens and a man of outstanding personality in the town of Trenton in which he was its first Mayor. Three all its growth and expansion he always took a progressive stand and was always in the forefront for everything that would spell progress for the steel and iron and car industries of the town.

He was born in Newfoundland and was always prominent in politics, and a leading worker and representative Liberal. He leaves a wife, four sons—Fred and E. J. in Trenton, Alfred in Western Canada and Phileas in Prince Edward Island and William in the States. Three daughters are also living—Mrs. John Baker in Trenton, Mrs. Beveridge and Mrs. Hanson in the States.

At Clifton, New London, on Thursday, April 22, the death of Grace MacLure, wife of the late John Simpson, of Hope River, occurred at the home of her son-in-law, Mr. B. L. McEwen. The deceased was 86 years of age, and had been active and well until about six months before her death. She bore her sufferings with Christian patience, which was characteristic of her life.

As she lay in her coffin her serene countenance and beautiful features bespoke her body as a fit temple for the indwelling of the presence of God.

She was laid to rest in Cavendish cemetery beside her husband, who predeceased her fifteen years ago. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Harrison.

Mrs. Simpson is survived by seven children: Fulton, Rebecca, and Lemuel, of Vancouver, B.C.; Matilda (Mrs. H. Carter) North Milton; Leander, Clifton; James O. Cavendish; Ada (Mrs. B. L. McEwen) at whose home she died.

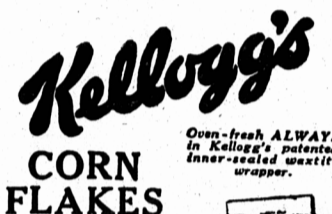
