ANOTHER NEW INDUSTRY STARTED IN BUSY AMHERST, N. S.

In Which Two Islanders, J. L. and Harry McLean Formerly of Crapaud, are Interested.

AMHERST, Jan. 26-The 2 Barkers, Ltd., of this town, who five years ago built a Mammoth Department Store, which is said to be the largest and most modern establishment of its kind east of Montreal, having a chain of branch stores throughout Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, have now under construction a large Machine Shop and Plant, part of which is already completed and equipped for the purpose of manufacturing Gasoline Engines and Motors. QUEBEC HAS A LARGE SURPLUS

QUEBEC, Jan. 25-At this afternoon's session of the house, Hon. Mr. MacKenzie, provincial treasurer, delivered his budget speech, which proved an interesting review of the financial state of the province for the past year, with encouraging estimates for the coming twelve months. The ordinary receipts amounted to \$7,032,744 and the ordinary expenditure to \$6,126,834. But as there had been an extraordinary expenditure of \$298,065, the actual surplus was announced as being \$607,845. The general summary of the speech emphasized the increasing prosperity of Quebec by which the government was able to announce a surplus of \$600,000 with provision for increased amounts in the cause of education, for the construction of iron bridges, for the abolition of toll gates, and the large loan for the improvements of roads. For 1912-13 the minister estimated that the ordinary revenues would reach \$7,133,221 and the total expenditures \$6,755,820. The minister announced that the federal subsidy as the result of the last census had been increased \$599,865, the total now being \$1,559,865.

A WONDERFUL RAILWAY

KEY WEST, Fla., Jan. 26-An unusual achievement in railroad construction was turned over to the world when a passenger train, seemingly supported by trail masonry steamed across seas from Knights Key to Key West. The terminus is 46 miles from Florida mainland. The main trip marked the opening of the over-water extension of the Florida Coast railway and was the signal for the beginning of the three days' celebration. One of the foremost figures among public men here

for the ceremonies was Henry M. Flagler of New York, to whom is given credit for completion of the engineering feat. It was Mr. Flagler, as president of the railroad, who overcame financial and physical obstructions, forcing the construction of a railway across the line of coral keys between the Florida mainland and Key West. For great distances between keys the rails are supported by stretches of steel and masonry. Warships from Portugal and Cuba, and vessels of the fifth division of the American Atlantic fleet are here for the ceremony. Assistant Secretary of War Olivier, representing President Taft, and members of the House naval affairs committee arrived here. They will go to Havana on the cruiser Washington, to return Friday or Saturday.

"DOCK" COOK IS "STUNG AGAIN"

NEW YORK, Jan. 24-A despatch to The Tribune from Hopkinsville says: While Frederick A. Cook was detailing at the Union Tabernacle last night the frigid terrors of his Polar trip in search of the North Pole, a swarm of bees that had taken refuge in the building from the cold weather and were thawed out by the heat made it hot for the audience. Several people were stung by the bees, and even Dr. Cook would pause frequently to slap at one on his neck. The bees got thawed quite enough to drop among the audience and crawl about.
