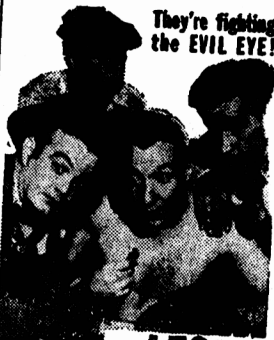

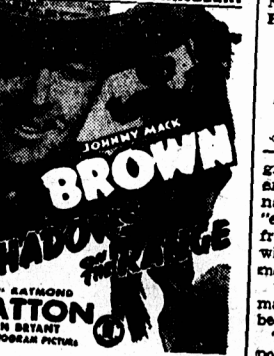

Government League, which earlier in the week protested any entry of Newfoundland into confederation on a 6,500 majority referendum vote, had split. One group was said to want to accept the majority decision and confederate while the other still was adamantly opposed. This latter group was reported as wanting to hold a mass protest meeting but the more moderate faction apparently was opposed to this. When such a meeting would be held, if at all, was not known. Confederation leader Joseph Smallwood said the "overwhelming majority" of those who had voted for responsible government last Thursday were prepared to accept the confederation decision. Various schemes were put forward today as a solution to Newfoundland's constitutional uncertainties. The Independent Evening Tele-

masks plunged through smoke and fumes to disconnect railway cars containing highly-explosive chemicals and move them out of range of the fire. Others operated bulldozers and tractors to open paths through wreckage. United States army officials said they understood the blast originated in a laquer plant and destroyed a six-storey building and several other structures in the immediate vicinity. Fire spread until an estimated 18 buildings had been destroyed or damaged.

80 Per Cent Destroyed One source said the plant, largest in the French zone, was about 80 per cent destroyed. (Reuters said a director of the Farben plant estimated that 125 of the plant's 500 buildings, occupying an area of seven square miles, were destroyed.) The casualty toll even included rescuers. Two persons were killed in a collision of two vehicles rushing to the disaster scene. The terrific blast was comparable to the disaster in April of last year at Texas City, Tex., when an estimated 850 persons were killed and 3,000 injured when a French ship loaded with nitrates blew up in the harbor. Chlorethyl gas is believed to have caused the disaster. It is

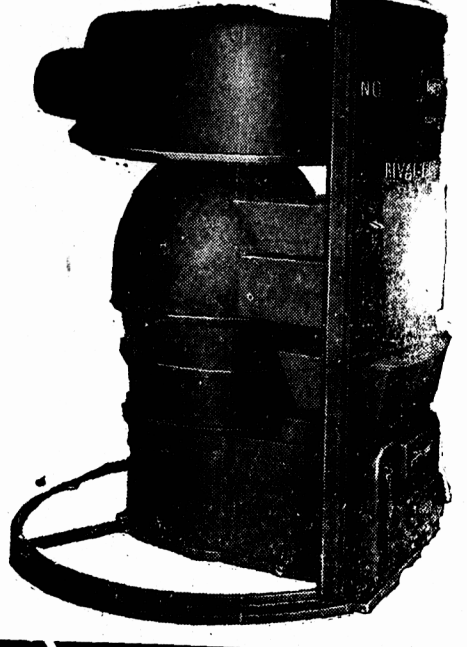

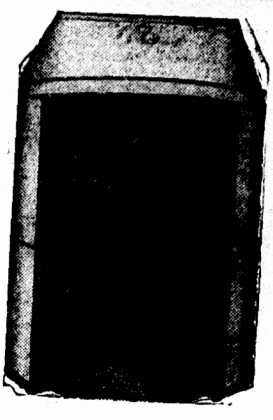

The Defeated Speak Mr. Godbout said he "accepted" the decision of the electorate. "I must accept their decision honestly and thank the electors who voted their own roads for the future," he said in a statement. "I trust they will broaden and always will lead towards social justice and the greatness of my country."

Mr. Gregoire said the Union Nationale victory was "a pure and simple robbery" of electors.

"Once more the voice of millions (of dollars) wins over the voice of the electorate," he said. "The more there are millions used for corruption and the less the results represent the true popular sentiment."

St. Laurent Silent External Affairs Minister St. Laurent, frequently mentioned as a likely successor to Prime Minister Mackenzie King, declined to comment. He made three campaign speeches on behalf of Mr. Godbout and the Liberal candidates.

With good weather prevailing throughout the Province during the day, most areas reported a heavy vote. The Canadian Press vote tabulation indicated that the

record 1944 vote of 1,330,056 would perhaps be exceeded by a small margin.

In piling its large majority, the Union Nationale smashed Liberal strongholds in Montreal and Quebec and in some of the rural areas as well. The winning party also captured seats formerly held by the Bloc Populaire which did not contest this election.

The Union Nationale won 26 former Liberal and three former Bloc Populaire seats. The Government also won the former C.C.F. seat of Rouyn-Noranda. The Liberals won the Gaspé North seat from the Union Nationale, but lost the Montreal St. Ann seat of Hanley. A total of 59 seats were unchanged. The new seat of Sag-

uenay elected a Union Nationale member. The election was one of the most orderly in recent years.
