Football Match at the C. A. A. Park

ABOUT two hundred persons witnessed the second football match of the league series between the Abegweits and St. Dunstan's College team on Saturday afternoon on the C. A. A. grounds. The field was in good condition when one considers the recent wet weather. The Abegweits kicked off about 4 o'clock and after ten minutes' play compelled the Saints to rouse for safety. The game was fought for the remainder of the half with matters much in the Collegians' favor, who finally by a rather remarkable rush forced the ball from their own territory to that of their opponents. Muffing on the part of the Abegweits' full-back lost the ball to M. McDonald of the Saints who passed to Donahoe. The latter with a clear field deposited the sphere safely behind the Abegweits goal. The Saints kicked for goal but went a little wide of the posts.

Saints 3, Abegweits 0. Half time found the ball hovering about centre. In the second half the city team made every endeavor to score but were twice compelled to rouse and the Saints once. Both teams played a swift game, but neither succeeded in scoring. The game was without doubt the best seen this season. The Abegweits were somewhat stronger in their forward line than in their first match. The quarters and halves made a first-rate line up, but the full-back was weak. The team showed lack of team-practice, they know the game well, but this will not take the place of careful training and hard work. The Collegians are well balanced, played a determined game, and owe their victory to the regular and conscientious team practices. They deserve every credit for the splendid work they have done. J. A. RUDDICK, Assistant Dominion Dairy Commissioner who recently visited British Columbia where he instituted a travelling dairy school, under the direction of J. E. Hopkins and C. W. McDougall, two competent instructors from the Northwest Territories. Classes have been held at Victoria, Comox and New Westminster concerning which very satisfactory reports have been received. The instructors will go next to Enderby in the Okanagan Valley, and the school will be closed on the first week of November. Mr. Ruddick visited a number of agricultural exhibitions during his stay in British Columbia, and noticed several fine displays of vegetables butter and fruit. The quality of the butter was excellent. British Columbia is making considerable progress in dairying, said Mr. Ruddick this morning although that progress is somewhat slow. The reason for this is that it is difficult to bring the land under cultivation, owing to the heavy timber. There are six creameries in operation in the Province all doing a successful business. Their total output would probably be about half a million pounds. The product was sold to merchants for thirty cents a pound, and by the latter retailed at 35 cents. Mr. Ruddick before returning visited all the Government creameries in the Northwest Territories. Their total output last year was over 600,000 lbs., but this season the total quantity of butter produced will be much larger. Most of the butter was disposed of at good prices in British Columbia. The greater number of the Northwest creameries are now free from debt, having repaid the loan which they received from the Government. Some have paid off as much as \$3,000 since they began operations four years ago. Settlement is taking place very rapidly in the territories, many of the newcomers having crossed the line from the United States. There are also a great number of foreigners, many of whom are doing well. [It will be remembered that Mr. Ruddick visited Charlottetown a short time ago and was interviewed by a GUARDIAN representative.]

A small fee was paid to procure the charter, the necessary books, etc. The secretary was authorized to send for the charter on Monday, and it is expected it will be here in about a week, when the union will be in full working order. The secretary will hold the list of charter members open until six o'clock, p. m. to-day, and any printer who was unable to be present at the meeting on Saturday night, can hand in his name together with the fee before that time.
