Firemen's Fair In Full Swing
The firemen's fair got under way last night with a greatly increased attendance despite rather unfavorable weather conditions. A splendid program of entertainment was presented, consisting in part of orchestra, vocal and dance numbers by the Dixie Concert Co. The Forum was lined with booths where bingo and games requiring skill were in full swing. Many people amused themselves by looking for the mystery man and the ten dollar prize that goes to the successful discoverer. Frankenstein, the ten foot mechanical man, was visited by large numbers of people who were greatly interested in the show the robot put on. The fair continues each night this week with a full program presented each night.

Y.M.C.A. Directors Hold Meeting
Y. M. C. A. activities were reviewed at the regular monthly meeting of the Association directors last night. Dr. J. A. Clark presided.

Mr. Norville E. Luck, general director of the local "Y" gave a short report. A boys' Hobbycraft Club had been organized he said, 32 boys, under the leadership of Mr. J. L. Curran, met in classes on Friday and Saturday. The boys' Stamp Club had also resumed activities. Another development Mr. Luck said, was the organization of a junior leaders' corps to give assistance in the junior physical work. A Sunday morning service at 10 o'clock planned especially for boys has been started.

As a community service a period had been set aside in the gymnasium on Thursday nights for organized groups of boys from the Churches. Several other organized groups have also been included in the special physical classes.

Saturday morning in the Gym has been reserved for school boys. Mr. Luck also mentioned the work which is carried out in cooperation with the Prince of Wales students, on Sunday evening the song service and on Saturday evenings a social gathering, 250 attended the Halloween social.

A very marked increase in bowling activities was reported, 16 different organizations are taking part. Increases have been noted in the physical classes which opened on the 19th, of October. In the ladies section 115 have enrolled. General attendance in the building, in reading room and at the games in the lobby, had also increased over last year the general secretary said.

MRS. THOMAS HYNES
There passed peacefully away in the early morning of September 28th, 1936, the soul of Mrs. Thomas Hynes, at the home of her daughter Mrs. Joseph Duffy, Emyvale, Lot 30.

She had been in her usual health and while coming down the church steps after attending Mass on Sunday, she fell and fractured her hip. Complications set in and she died the following morning, fortified by the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church, of which she was a devoted member.

She was an honest, charitable and industrious woman, beloved by all who knew her. Her maiden name was Annie Doyle; she was born in Vernon River parish in 1852, and lived there all her life, until four years ago, when, after her husband's death she moved to Emyvale and lived with her married daughter.

There are left to mourn two daughters; Emma, Mrs. John Mahar, Rumford, Me., Martha, Mrs. Joseph Duffy, Emyvale, P. E. I.; also an adopted son Martin Hynes, Summerville, P. E. I.; one brother John Doyle, Earnsccliffe, P. E. I. Another brother, Rev. Patrick B. Doyle, O. P. predeceased her last November; and one sister, Sister Mary Loreita, D. O. S. of New York City. Rev. Edwin Doyle of Calgary, Alberta and Sister Ambrosine of North Dakota are also a nephew and niece of the deceased.

Her funeral, which took place on Wednesday, Sept. 30, from her late residence to Vernon River Church, was largely attended by old neighbours and relatives who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one they loved so well. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. P. D. McGuigan, as listed by Rev. A. L. Herrell P. P. Lot 6 after which the remains of a kin and loving mother were tenderly laid beside her dear husband.

Students Hold Demonstration
A parade "200 strong" marching along the streets of Charlottetown last night caused citizens to rub their eyes in amazement and wonder if they, like the renowned Rip Van Winkle, had been asleep for a year and that it was already Halloween 1937. 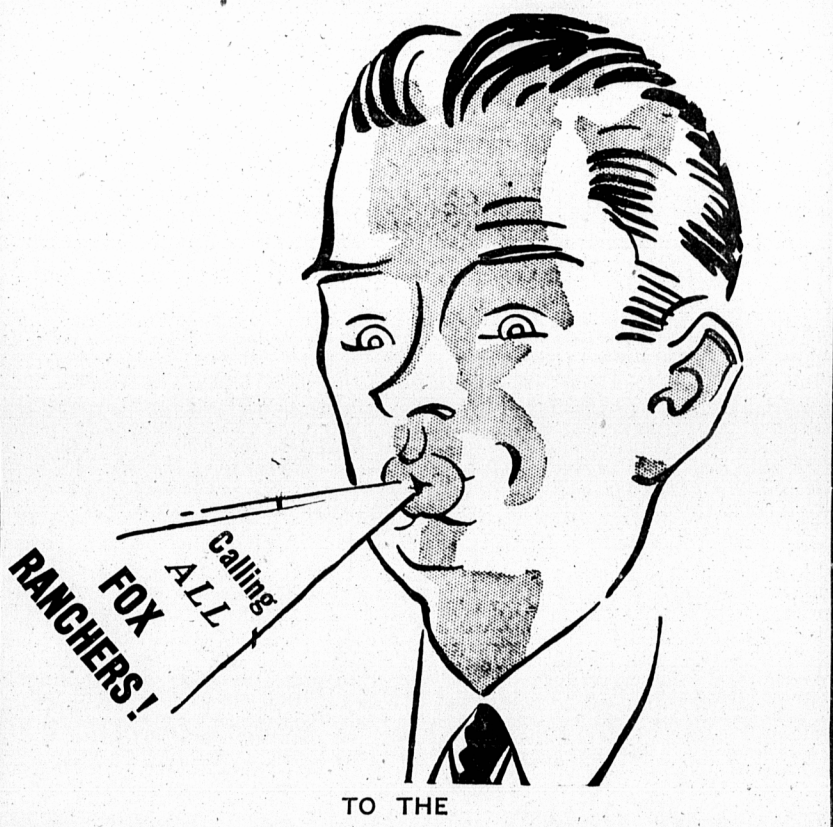
