### Injured Player Slightly Improved

#### Shore, Deeply Grieved Says Accident Was Purely Unintentional.

BOSTON, Dec. 14.—Irvin "Ace" Shore, dangerously injured Toronto Leaf hockey player, came through a long and delicate trepanning operation on his fractured skull in encouraging condition tonight in the famous neurosurgical ward of the Boston City Hospital.

Dr. Martin Croft, Boston Bruins' physician who assisted Dr. Donald Munro of the City Hospital staff, and Dr. John S. Hodgson during the surgery and acted as head nurse of the ward, said the 31 year old player's condition showed a slight improvement when he was removed from the table. It would be a matter of many hours, he said, before the crisis arrived. Feels on the fluid removed from Bailey's spine this afternoon indicated injured tissue and continued internal bleeding. Although his own surgeons refused to hazard an opinion on whether or not Bailey, in the event that he makes a complete recovery, would be able to continue his hockey career, the consensus of non-participating experts was that he would not.

Shore, who was knocked down by a five inch skull fracture when knocked to the ice by Eddie Shore, Bruin defence star in the Leaf-Bruin game. The latter suffered a gash that required seven stitches close when he was knocked down by Red Horner, Toronto's fiery defenceman.

### Canadian Coal Will Benefit Say Producers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—United States coal operators complained to the Interstate Commerce Commission that they had suffered serious losses in Canada through competition from Nova Scotia coal and declared that an increase in coal rates would mean more drastic losses in the Canadian markets.

H. O. Finley, of Cleveland, vice-president of the Youngblood and Ohio Coal Company; P. C. Sprague, vice president of the Hanna Coal Company of Wheeling, West Virginia, and William Tmory, Jr., of Cleveland, representing the Campbridge Collieries Company, told a commission examiner that a "Buy Canadian" movement in the Dominion was partially responsible.

The 30 cent increase in lake cargo rates to points east of the Straits of Mackinac and west of Brockville, Ont., proposed by both the northern and southern carriers as a means of stimulating all rail shipments, would make the Nova Scotia competition even more of a threat to their financial well-being, they said.

Today's testimony was the last before the examiner takes over the case to make his report.

### Non-Stop Flight Around the World

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 14.—Are Goebel expert mechanic who became one of America's famous flyers, said today he is planning a non-stop airplane flight around the world in record time next July.

By making three refuelings in mid-air, and using a plane that will lift 2,000 gallons of gasoline, using an automatic pilot, planning every detail minutely and leaving the rest to the kind spirit that guided him in almost a straight line from California to Hawaii in 1927 to win the \$50,000 gold flight prize, he expects to do the trip in less than five days.

He said he has been planning it since 1929.

### MAJORS ADOPT UNIFORM BALL

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—The Major League today voted to adopt a uniform ball as a climax to one of the most important series of meetings in baseball history. The new ball, livelier than the one used during the past few years in the National League and patterned almost exactly along the specifications of the American League sphere, will make its debut in next spring's training camps. It will be the only ball recognized or used in the Majors.

### Timely Tips On Sport

Tonight, will be the last time the Wolves will be seen in action until Wednesday, Dec. 27th, with the Moncton Hawks playing two days later, Friday, 29th. The only game next week will be with Saint John Beavers who will play Wednesday, 30th.

Reason for above changes is that the section, so designated, since route of play will be changed, goes into effect Dec. 18th. On Monday the 18th, Saint John plays at Halifax, Charlottetown at Moncton. Returning home the Abbies meet the Beavers on Wednesday, 20th, while Halifax goes to Moncton. On Friday Moncton will play at Halifax while the Abbies will journey to Saint John.

It is this section routing which caused so much complaint from the Island representatives as it is very expensive and also does not give them nearly as suitable dates for the various games as may be seen, one week the only game is with Saint John while the following week Halifax and Moncton play here with but one night's interval.

The hunting party included King Boris and Queen Joanna of Bulgaria, who arrived yesterday, and King Alexander, Queen Marie and Prince Cyril of Bulgaria. They sought partridges and wild geese on the royal hunting ground at Smejski Mitrovitsa.

Meanwhile, Nicholas Moushanoff, Premier and Minister of Foreign Affairs of Bulgaria, and Mr. Milan Gershakoff, Jugoslavian Minister of Foreign Affairs, spent the morning in conference.
